Serve INEC With Integrity, V-C Advises UniPort Staff

Staff of the University recruited by the Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC) as Ad-hoc to assist in the conduct of the rerun election scheduled for Saturday, March 19, 2016 in the State, have been advised to serve the Commission with commitment and integrity so as not to bring the image and reputation of the University into disrepute.

Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ndonye Lulu, who gave the stern warning last Monday at the Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, while addressing the 200 staff, who made the list which he personally signed and forwarded to INEC, vowed to deal decisively with any staff of the University found to have compromised his or her integrity by manipulating election results in favour any political party during the rerun election.

The warning, according to the Vice-Chancellor, became

imperative following the allegation by Governor Nyesom Wike that two staff of the University, Dr. O. I. U. Ekpenyong and Dr. Gift W. M. E., colluded with a chieftain and candidate of the All Progressives Congress

(APC), Dr. Dikwa George to compile names of persons that would favour the All Progressive Congress (APC) as Ad-Hoc staff of INEC.

The Vice-Chancellor, who stated his own side of the story during the stakeholders' meeting he convened, which was also attended by selected media organisations, explained that his choice of the Acting Dean of Student Affairs Department, Dr. Ekpenyong, to compile the names of prospective Ad-Hoc staff of INEC was in response to a request from the Commission.

UniPort, RSSDA Set Up Partnership Steering Committees

Both UniPort and the Rivers State Government (RSSDA) have established steering committees, both organisations have started to actualise the plan with the setting up of steering committees to give effect to the partnership. This agreed to immediately and the Federal Integrated Water Resources Scheme (FIWRS) Consulting, Construction and Management Programme, is one of the major aspects of the partnership agreement.

Establishment of the new steering committee was the outcome of another visit by the Management of the University to the Rivers State Governor's Office which ended on Friday, March 4, 2016.

The visitation which would investigate interest level of the two organisations would reveal their interests and expectations of the existing Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the collaborating organisations. The MoU signed in 2013, has been in place since December 2013 to the last visit of the Honourable Mr. Adams Oshiomhole, the Governor of Sagata State, Mr. Ifeanyi Ubah, before his arrival at the Rivers State.

Under the proposed partnership, the Rivers State Government would have responsibilities for running a key pipeline programme as well as finance the implementation of the RSLC water scheme. This Committee will be chaired by the General Manager, Agro and Agricultural programmes of FIRBLL, Mr. Olusegun Ilesanjuwa. Dr. Davies of the Institute of Agricultural Research and Development is to lead the Agricultural Research and Development in Collaboration. Mgt Explains Contributory Pension Scheme Administration To ASUU

Vice-Chancellor, Professor Silas Late, has revealed that he would not provide written administration that will explain why the institution is not able to administer its pension scheme in line with the Federal Government's compensation package. The current discussions on the Contributory Pension Scheme would take off emanating in March, 2016. Please note that all the discussions in respect of the Contributory Pension Scheme are for the staff and are paid to third Pension Fund Administrators," the statement further clarified.

Not satisfied with the Registrar's explanation, Chukwuemeka Uche, Secretary of ASUU, Professor Anthony Okereke, who was his member in the meeting, told the Vice-Chancellor that Congress had directed them to review the University's administration with the statement issued by the Registrar on behalf of Management.

and the Budget Office of the Federation.

The Vice-Chancellor, who also disclosed that Senator Mike Aso, Hon. Henry Burton is charge of Treasury, Dr. Folasade Awoye and Director, University Data Centre, Mr. Obinna Ifeakwui, to make more clarifications on the subject issue, had no objection to the ASUU's demand that it had to be with the Bureau of Economic Planning and Statistics.

Professor Late made the clarifications last Wednesday, in response to the position advanced by the University of Port Harcourt branch of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) which he said "was not appropriate in such universities that cannot afford to state everything generalization. From all indications, those institutions made their computations based on the old system which is no longer in use with the new policy of the Federal Government. So there is no uniformity in what other universities are doing or calculating as ASUU had insisted."

Professor Late reassured ASUU that the proposed implementation of the new Contributory Pension Scheme from the month of March would be to strict adherence with extant policy instruments by relevant agencies of the Federal Government, including the National Salary, Incomes and Wages Commission

Salary Structure (NSCWS) at 7.5% based on the Consolidated Salary Structure of 2006 and subsequent 2008.

The Vice-Chancellor explained that Management's decision to implement the new policy, was premised on the budget deficit incurred by the University resulting into about N30 million after all deductions were made at source by the Federal Government. He advised the Dean to approach relevant Government Agencies for information or clarification on any areas in the discourse, explaining that financial information of the University was readily available on the Government Integrated Financial Management Information System (GIFMIS) platform.

A statement from the office of the Registrar indicated that the event is scheduled for Wednesday, April 27, 2016 in the Senate Chamber, University Park, at 10 am. The statement further added that the session will mark the retirement disengagement of the selected Professors from the University of Port Harcourt.

Those to be honoured are Professors Cloy Battah,

Joseph Ifeadi, Ngwu Okorie, Benjamin Ekwe, Joseph Shafa and Redmond Ebuehi all of the Faculty of Sciences. Others are Professors Anthony Odebiyi, Oluwalana Nnamdi and Olisa Ifeadi of the Faculty of Science, as well as Professor Olisa Ifeadi of the Faculty of Postgraduate Studies.

Advising citation to be read in front of his Faculties with whom served, the Vice-Chancellor is also expected to pay tributes to each of the retiring Professors for their distinguished services to the University. This will mark the second time the University would be honouring retiring Professors at Special Honorary service.
