"It is used as a medium of formal education, government administration and legal processes; it can be used as language of inter-ethnic comunication and also as a second and official language," he said. was systematic and recurrent. "It is an unconscious violation of the rules generating grammatical or wellformed words and sentences in the target language," he disclosed, listing the categories of errors to include

Thursday March 30, 2017. Levan, whose Lecture was entitled: The Rational Counter terrorist? Economic Policy and Insurgent Insecurity in Nigeria's 2015 Presidential Campaign examined the internal governance of the major political parties as well as other issues which he said was believed to have influenced the outcome of the elections. He said that "the process leading to the election saw both parties campaign on a number of issues which include insurgency and insecurity as well as economic performance of the party in power," observing that "social issues such as health, education, food security and women and gender issues were not

given much attention as such." Professor Levan, who is of the School of International Service, said that "it was important to examine what major political parties talked about in the 2015 presidential election because such differences mattered in explaining the contents of their campaigns," adding that studies indicated that there has not been much comparative research on how insurgencies impact campaign strategies of the political parties. He identified "party politics such as religious appeal, primaries/reform, defections/ mergers, party reform; insecurity such as Boko Haram, Chibok girls, non terrorism foreign policy, crime; Electoral Integrity such as Administration and Independent National Electoral Commission (INEC), political violence, electoral fraud, electoral law; Economic such as corruption, jobs, growth and inflation, as well as

he Faculty of Engineering has survived the first hurdle in securing full accreditation for its programmes as the Council for the Regulation of Engineering in

Conveying the approval for Engineering programmes in a letter dated March 20, 2017, which was addressed to the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ndowa Lale, a copy of which was obtained by UniPort Weekly, Registrar of COREN, Engineer Wopa Kamila Maliki,

disclosed that the approval which took effect from February 2, 2017 would last until February 2022. He further revealed that Petroleum and Gas, Civil. Electrical/Electronics, Chemical and Mechanical Engineering secured full accreditation for their Undergraduate programmes, while Petroleum and Gas, Chemical and Mechanical Engineering also secured full accreditation to mount Graduate programmes for the next five years.

"I write to convey the approval of the Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria (COREN), on the accreditation visitation to the Undergraduate and Postgraduate Diploma Engineering programmes of your institution from 29" January to 2" February, 2017

"The effective date of the accreditation is 2" February, 2017. It is necessary to point out that Full Accreditation is valid for (5) five years," part of the letter read, pointing out that the Council

would embark on random visits to the University within the validity period of the accreditation to assess the level of compliance

to set standards. Responding to the development, a visibly elated Dean of the Faculty of Engineering, Professor Maureen Etebu, disclosed that the news of securing full accreditation status was well-received by staff and students of the Faculty. "The Faculty is rejoicing that it has secured accreditation from the apex regulatory body of our profession. At the last exercise, we secured interim accreditation, so what we needed was the full accreditation that we have just secured and we are very happy at this development that would now motivate staff and students to concentrate on academic excellence. This is a clean bill that would enable us continue in our mandate of teaching. carrying out research and community service in the various fields of Engineering in this University," Professor Etebu stated. She praised the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Lale for creating an enabling environment that brought the success story to her Faculty, promising to justify the support from the Management of the University.
