concluded by the Stanley Lawson Chair in Environmental Geology to host a one-day knowledgesharing stakeholders' workshop on effective remediation of hydrocarbon pollution sites in the Niger Delta region. Information made available to UNIPORT Weekly by Chairman of the Local Organizing Committee and Chair Occupant, Professor Enuvie Akpokodje, indicated that the target audience for the workshop to be held at Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, University Park, would include major petroleum industry players, government ministries, departments and agencies, including regulatory agencies, host communities, civil society organizations, remediation practitioners, professional bodies and allied stakeholders.

The workshop would, amongst other issues, devise ways and means of reducing periodic conflicts between oil firms, government and host communities, improved performance of remediation efforts by stakeholders through acquisition of requisite technical knowledge, harmonized remediation criteria and monitoring, industry compliance with multiple regulatory regimes and matters of transparency.

Other anticipated gains of the workshop include harmonization and integration of parallel remediation criteria and performance monitoring guidelines for greater efficiency and integration of international best practices in management of hydrocarbon polluted sites in the Niger Delta region. "The workshop is also expected to focus on how to attain improved environmental stewardship, biodiversity, water quality and opportunities for increased local content in remediation activities", Prof Akpokodje disclosed, adding that seasoned Resource Persons would be on hand to address the sub-themes of the workshop.

The workshop agenda would consist of panel and group discussions at plenary and parallel sessions, according to the LOC Chairman, who added that "the event would also focus on strategies for the implementation of the United Nations Environmental Programme (UNEP) Report on the remediation of

impacted communities in the Niger Delta area-especially Ogoni land".

Elaborating further on the necessity of the workshop, the LOC Chairman disclosed that the Niger Delta region, which he described as the third largest wetland in the world and one of the richest, has suffered from over 50 years of oil and gas exploration and production, resulting in severe contamination of soil and groundwater in numerous sites which require cost effective and sustainable remediation".

Professor Akpokodje, who cited over 400 cases of

and 2009, regretted that the 2001 UNEP Report has

underpinning remedial approaches and building an accurate site conceptual model in the selection of optimal remediation methods for each impacted site". According to the LOC Chairman, sharing technical knowledge and experience, training and collaboration among major stakeholders, would contribute to greater success and effectiveness of hydrocarbon pollution remediation in the Niger Delta region. He appealed to the University community and the general public to attend the workshop which opens at 10.00am.

BE, UNIPORT, Mount Workshop for Teachers In Rivers State

fforts aimed at equipping teachers in the employment of the Rivers State Government has received a major boost as the State Universal Basic Education Board(UBE) and University of Port Harcourt collaborated in training about 100 teachers in subject areas that are relevant to the overall matrix of learning.

Declaring the 10-day Workshop open at the Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, University Park, last Wednesday, Rivers State Commissioner of Education, who was represented by a Director in the Ministry, Mrs May Solomon noted that the training was aimed at enhancing teaching skills in line with global standards. The Commissioner advised participants to translate the knowledge acquired into better classroom performance in their relationship with pupils. "There is no reason why pupils in public schools should not compete favourably with their counterparts in private schools", she said.

Delivering the Keynote Address, Executive Chairman of the Board, Sir Allio Oruitemeka noted that the Board in partnership with the University had embarked on the training programme for teachers in the State to enhance service delivery in the subject areas under consideration. Commending the State Government for investing in the sector, Oruitemeka observed that the Board was complementing the efforts of government through the design of professional development programmes. "This is not a training to satisfy the rituals of a workplace, but one aimed at identifying the specific training needs of teachers and frontally addressing them", he stated.

Welcoming the guests to the University, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, represented by the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research and Development), Professor Bene Willie-Abbey, who emphasized the importance of training programmes to enhance competence, stressed the need for participants to embrace new teaching skills that are compliant to the emergent scientific and technological age. "We have a robust Faculty of Education, equipped with the best brains and modern teaching facilities", the Vice-Chancellor remarked, advising participants to tap from the wealth of knowledge of the Resource Persons to improve their skills and capacity to deliver knowledge to

pupils.

Representative of the Executive Secretary of the Universal Basic Education Commission (UBEC) Abuia. Mrs Helen Okoro, who disclosed that the Commission was out to monitor proper expenditure of revenue allocated by the Federal Government for training and capacity-building of teachers in the State, urged participants to disseminate knowledge acquired at the Workshop to other colleagues and use same to improve classroom experience for pupils, expressing satisfaction with the level of training provided by the University.

Google Trains ICTC

In their separate goodwill messages, one of the visiting Lecturers, Mr Richard Amorin and a Student, Rose Teye, thanked authorities of the University for the programme, which they said had exposed them to both theoretical and practical knowledge of exploration activities in the field, expressing optimism that the collaboration with the University of Port Harcourt, which is widely known for quality hydrocarbon training would transform the Petroleum Engineering Department of UMaT into the best in oil and gas studies in Ghana. They thanked all schedule officers, who worked with them for displaying a high sense of maturity in handling the excesses of some students, stating that they were really empowered by the knowledge gained from the programme in UNIPORT.

Uba, who noted that the era of using paper in reprinting and reading documents, thereby wasting papers and ink is over, listed G-Dot and G-Plus as some of the products the organization is bringing to the University, explaining that with the use of G-Dot, offices could save cost by sharing documents of any volume, proofread and edit manuscripts without having to print them.

G-Plus, according to him, "is a social network tool, but the greatest benefit is that it has the features of *Facebook* and Twitter put together. What you can do on Twitter or Facebook, you can do on G-Plus. It goes even further to give you more functions, including what we call Google Hang-out, which gives you the opportunity to engage in video-conferencing call with other people. For instance, if we are on Google Hang-out, the Vice-Chancellor can have a conference with us without making physical contact or coming to a conference room. It is like tele-conferencing." Uba, who acknowledged that there are infrastructural challenges in terms of ownership of personal computers and accessories, explained that if a Lecturer wants to administer a test to his students, he could share the scripts to them via G-Plus. "If he stores a lecture note in his Laptop, a Lecturer could send the information to students with ease." Other members of the Google team included: Osagie Obasohan, Kelvin Odum and Adams Shittu.

Meanwhile, representative of the Director of ICTC and

h Programmer/Analyst at the Centre, Mr Sarafa Lawal, has said that "the essence of the workshop was to train technical staff of the ICTC on latest Google applications

to replace the package currently in use if found to be more effective". This, he said, is in addition to providing a bigger bandwidth that would accommodate more users of the network, as well as training students known as Google Ambassadors on some useful applications.

Lawal noted that the applications would be very relevant to the Bursary, as well as during Student Registration, amongst other Departmental uses, adding that there would be more sensitization among staff and students on the new packages.

Finance Ministry Urges Speedy Completion Of Projects In UNIPORT

ontractors handling capital projects awarded by the Federal Government in the University of Port Harcourt, have been charged to expedite action to ensure timely completion of such projects or face possible sanction. Team Leader of a monitoring group assigned to the South-South Zone from the Budget Office of the Federation in the Federal Ministry of Finance Abuja, Hassan Abdu, gave the charge when he led a delegation on the 2012 Capital Budget Monitoring Exercise in the University, last Wednesday.

Mr Abdu, who urged the University to impress it on the Contractors to fully mobilize to the various sites and complete such projects within the stipulated timeframe, said funds for first and second quarters for the projects have been released, while the third quarter funds are being processed and would be released soon, advising authorities of the University to ensure that the Contractors keep to the schedule for the projects.

"We have released the money for the projects; they should utilize them by implementing the projects within the stated timeline. Please we want you to convey this message to them. They should meet up the job description; time is of the essence to us", the Team Leader said, expressing dissatisfaction over their findings on the slow pace of work at most sites visited.

Receiving the Team on behalf of the University, Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research and Development), Professor Bene Willie-Abbey and Deputy Bursar (Treasury), Dr Felicia Ayuwo, who represented the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka and Acting Bursar, Mr Vitalis Aliezi, solicited understanding of the deltaic nature of the area, attributing the delay in completing most of the projects to constant rain. They assured the Team that the University would assist the monitoring group to impress it upon the Contractors to accelerate the pace of work at the project sites.

"Infrastructural development in this region is a bit difficult due to the terrain and weather. However, they will improve on the pace of work as the weather will become favourable any moment from now", Professor Willie-Abbey said.

Other members of the Capital Budget Monitoring Team, who were accompanied by a journalist and member of a civil society group were: Ndana Abdulrazau, Dr Hassan Haruna and Mr Oyere Okosor.

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nations indicate that the under-fives constitute the most atrisk group, being the majority among ill and dead children with newborns and post-neonatal infants being most represented.

"It is therefore sensible to focus on this group if development targets are to be attained. Consequently, the Integrated Management of Childhood Illness (IMCI), which seeks to improve child survival targets disease conditions and interventions that impact most on this age group," she stated, adding that "Millennium Development Goals (MDGs)-4 specifically seeks to reduce under-five child deaths by twothirds by 2015 and all its related monitoring indicators are among the under-fives."

Nte, who pointed out that the knowledge of where these highly preventable under-five deaths occur is important for targeting child survival interventions, especially in resource-limited settings, said: "under-five deaths occur world-wide, but the rates are unacceptably high in resource-limited settings," disclosing that "Data from the *Countdown to 2015, 2012 Report* and *The Levels & Trends in Child Mortality Report 2011*, indicate insufficient progress in child survival in these countries, in spite of the dramatic decline of child deaths and highlighted the need for accelerated progress as only 23 Countdown countries were on track to achieve MDGs 4 and 13."

According to her, 50 per cent under-five deaths occurred in five countries, including India, Nigeria, Democratic Republic of Congo, Pakistan; with India and Nigeria recording 22 and 11 per cent, respectively, accounting for a third of these preventable deaths. She said that poverty, ignorance and disease work in concert with other factors to undermine child survival in Nigeria.

Nte, who is the immediate past Director of the Institute of Maternal and Child Health in the College of Health Sciences, observed that "the high risk for under-five deaths in Nigeria is further demonstrated by the fact that in 2010, an estimated 134,754,000 live births, 7,614,000 under-five deaths (5.65% total births) occurred globally compared to 6,332,000 live births and 861,000 under-five deaths estimated for Nigeria, indicating that the country's under-five deaths to total live birth ratios (13.6%) was about 2.5 times the global figure of 5.6%.

"Globally, the immediate causes of under-five deaths have remained infections (64%), malnutrition (down from 54% to about one third) and newborn deaths, both from hospital and community level data in developed and developing countries," she explained, adding that the distant and intermediate determinants of under-five deaths may explain their greater risks in resource-limited settings compared to their counterparts in industrialized nations.

"Studies have shown that children of the poor are more likely to die than those of the rich for many reasons, including increased exposure risks to disease through inadequate water

w Dean, Faculty of Science, Professor Nnenna Frank-Peterside, has disclosed plans to explore available opportunities in the Faculty to reposition it for enhanced productivity, stating that during her tenure, the Faculty would take advantage of the presence of over 70 Professors to uplift the University to an enviable status.

Professor Frank-Peterside, who made the disclosure in an interview with UNIPORT Weekly in her office last Tuesday, said that she would bring her experience as

supply and sanitation, indoor air pollution, crowding, poor housing conditions and high exposure to disease vectors. They are also more likely to have lower resistance to infectious diseases; malnutrition caused by diets deficient in one or more essential micronutrients, low birth weight as a result of poor maternal nutrition, infections during pregnancy, and short birth intervals, amongst others," she pointed out, stressing that poverty increased exposure and reduced resistance to diseases in the group.

Nte, who observed that children born by poor uneducated, young or elderly mothers, were particularly at risk of death, stated that "they die mainly from pneumonia, diarrhoea, malnutrition, complications of preterm delivery and birth asphyxia, which are either largely preventable or treatable, using available, effective and evidence-based low-cost interventions. These deaths occur because of several obstacles to accessing quality care, low coverage of effective evidencebased interventions, poverty, lack of maternal education and women's low socioeconomic status," regretting that "at current rate, we cannot attain MDG 4.

"Although Nigeria contributes 2.3% of the global population, its under-five death burden is 11.3% of the global total. Consequently, unless child survival improves in Nigeria, the global efforts will not yield the desired result," she said, stating that "the politicization of health and relevant sectors, misapplication and poor utilization of resources, and insecurity pose additional challenges to child survival in Nigeria."

Identifying inadequate manpower, lack of funding amongst others, as some of the factors militating against child survival in the country, the Inaugural Lecturer called for concerted efforts from stakeholders to win the war against child mortality. "Government at all levels must ensure equitable access of all Nigerians to quality healthcare through implementations of the National Health Policy, and other policies, guidelines and strategies adopted at different international and national meetings. These include the Child Health, School Health, Infant and Young Child Feeding and Nutrition Policies, IMNCH Strategy, amongst others," she recommended.

On her contributions to child survival in Nigeria, Professor Nte, who stated that exclusive breast feeding alone could prevent 13% of infant mortality, disclosed that she had carried out research on various aspects of child health, presented and published papers at conferences, including books and journals; mentored other health workers, trained manpower at both undergraduate and postgraduate levels, in addition to sensitizing women on child health, safety and rights, amongst others.

In his remarks, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who described the Inaugural Lecturer as "a Senior Advocate of Nigerian Women and Children", commended Professor Nte for her advocacy works in the health sector, stating that "this Lecture was very engaging, but very painful because of the frightening statistics she reeled out to demonstrate the sordid plight of Nigerian children. We are told that about 7.6 million children die yearly. What an avoidable waste of future talents and valuable manpower for our dear country? "The Inaugural Lecturer has told us what we can do; what our hospitals can do, what the University can do, what the State and Federal Governments can do and what the companies can do to save the lives of Nigerian infants, who die daily of largely avoidable ailments. The painful thing is that we are not doing enough for the survival of our precious children," the Vice-Chancellor said, adding that "from what she said, we are far from achieving MDG 4, and if we can't achieve that, we are unlikely to achieve anything, in spite of what the politicians tell us. This is a major challenge for government and for all of us. We can and should indeed do a lot more to save our children".

New Dean Of Science Promises Quality Service Delivery ...As Students Launch Operation Keep Ofrima Clean

"We will arise and take our place by fully utilizing our potentials as the largest Faculty in the University to create impact", the new Dean promised, expressing optimism that the Faculty would be empowered to deliver quality teaching, research and community services, as according to her, the total number of Professors in the Faculty alone could constitute a University of its own.

"We run laboratories in all Departments; so we need regular power supply to expose our

She further disclosed plans to strengthen staff-students relationship through the provision of Staff Advisers to all students of the Faculty, adding that her administration would ensure timely release of Faculty Spread Sheets to minimize the rate of students overstaying on programmes.

Professor Frank-Peterside identified lack of space for staff and students of the Faculty, as well as poor sanitation as some of the challenges facing the Faculty, expressing hope that some of the problems would be tackled by her administration with support from her colleagues and students, including outside stakeholders. Meanwhile, the new Dean has commended the UNIPORT Chapter of Nigerian Association of Science Students (NASS), for donating a set of Public Address System (PAS) with mixer amplifier, PV speakers and wireless microphones to service the MBA 1 Classroom. The students also renovated an abandoned toilet facility provided by Professor Roseline Konya when she was Commissioner of Environment in Rivers State.

President of NASS, Olua Victor, told our Correspondent that the Association also embarked on other activities such as Freshers' Tournament, featuring football, volleyball and table tennis competitions and an Orientation party for fresh students of the Faculty, disclosing that *Operation keep Ofrima Clean* would be launched this Wednesday, where waste bins and sewage materials would be provided at strategic locations to ensure cleanliness of the complex.

ONE IN FIVE **VARSITIES WILL BE FORCED TO CLOSE OR MERGE** IN RUSSIA

President ussian Vladimir Putin has ordered reorganisation of state universities that will lead to some closures. The Minister of Education and Science, Dimitry Livanov, said that one in five universities could be shut down or forced to merge over the next two or three years.

Putin said: "There is a need to identify inefficient universities

by the end of the current year. At the same time the programme of restructuring, including through mergers with strong universities, should be developed and approved prior to May 2013."

He said the implementation of these plans would take place within a draft law on education, which is to be submitted by the government to the State Duma - the lower House of Parliament. In the meantime, the government has already started to prepare for the implementation of Putin's order.

According to Livanov, there are plans to cut up to a fifth of domestic universities and about 30% to 35% of university branches. Russia has some 600 universities, with more than 1,400 branches.
