Faculty of Biological Sciences, disclosed that "the 2006 International Union for the



Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List, names 1,173 fish species world-wide that are threatened with extinction."

These, according to him, include the cod, devils' hole pup fish, the coelacanths and the great white shark, adding that "many freshwater fish are particularly threatened because they live in smaller water bodies that are more prone to pollution and habitat degradation."

Sikoki disclosed that fish has been an important source of protein throughout history, stating that "the Food and

there were a good number of issues that required to be addressed, but since we came on board we have been able to clear such matters", he said. "We also want to establish a Cooperative Scheme like the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU). This way, we can encourage members to develop the attitude of saving for the rainy day", he said, stressing that the association presently has an understanding with Haier Thermocool to assist its members procure state-of-the-art electronic appliances, where members can collect and pay on installmental basis.

He appealed to Management to give the union the necessary support to enable it render quality services to its members.

The Chairman commended Staff of the Information, Publications and Public Relations (IPPR), Unit of the University for their dedication to service and efficient dissemination of information on Campus, charging other staff to emulate the Unit in diligent performance of their duty schedules. He further emphasized the need for members to be productive at their duty posts and comply with Managements directive to improve on their attitude to work.

Mr Syder called on Management to provide an enabling working environment for staff for them to deliver on their jobs, as well as address other areas of need facing workers so as to encourage greater productivity.

Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, made the disclosure in his address at the ceremony held last Tuesday at Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, affirming that the graduands met all stringent conditions specified by Senate of the University for the award of the Bachelor of Technology (B.Tech) degree and Associate Membership of NISLT which qualified them for the Induction.

A breakdown of the figure of the seven options in the School showed that 34 students graduated from Biochemistry/Chemical Technology, 108 for Biomedical Technology, Geology/Mining Technology (56), Industrial Chemistry/Petrochemical Technology (46), Microbiology Technology (54), Physics with Electronics Technology (26) and Physics with Production Technology (2)

Professor Ajienka, who commended the graduands, some of who took additional step to enroll and pass out successfully in the international certification examinations conducted by the American-based National Registry of Environmental Practitioners (NREP), expressed delight with the professional bodies for collaborations aimed at producing quality graduates from the University.

"I encourage you to strive towards the ideals of diligence and excellence in service to your community, workplace and humanity. You must ensure that the best industry practices are maintained at all times in your professional practice. That way, you would have justified the huge resources expended on you by the University and your parents as you prepare to render service to mankind," the Vice-Chancellor told the graduands, recalling that as the first Nigerian university to run the Science Laboratory Technology as a Faculty-based programme, the University would continue to give priority to the welfare of students to bring out the best in them.

In her welcome message, Provost, College of Natural and Applied Sciences, Professor Nnenna Frank-Peterside, stated that: "As you step fully into the

Presenting the Keynote Address on "Science Laboratory Professional Ethics," Mr Anthony Mumuni, charged the new Inductees to strictly comply with the ethics of the profession. 

Briefing UNIPORT Weekly, on the development, Professor Okoh said: "the play was actually a screenplay from the very beginning and I envisioned that it would go to the big screen one day. First of all, it was created for the screen, then we adapted it to stage and now we are taking it back to the screen, where it was originally intended.

"I feel great and anxious to see how it turns out on the screen and I hope that it works. I am quite impressed with the effort of the crew so far and I wish that most of our students will come and really see how to produce a film," Okoh noted, adding that "the play was necessitated by the need to educate people, especially young graduates on how to conduct themselves during interviews. Most Nigerians do not know how to perform in interviews, whether it is for employment within or outside the University.

"In companies a typical company setting, most applicants or interviewees fail to secure jobs, not because they are not qualified, but because they do not know how to prepare themselves for such interviews. They do not have the technical know-how to handle interview questions or how to comport themselves during interviews. Agric Econs Dept Partners FADAMA Project

he National FADAMA Development Project (FADAMA III) in Rivers State, has given the Department of Agricultural Economics and Extension the green light to form a FADAMA User Group (FUG) to drive the on-going formation of FUGs amongst farmers in the University's host communities.

New Acting Head, Department of Agricultural Economics and Extension, Dr Samuel Olatunji, who made the disclosure to *UNIPORT Weekly*, said the



ension services-related and it is part of our Agricultural Extension Community-Outreach Programme", he noted, expressing delight that the Department solicited assistance from the Management of FADAMA III Project to give it another slot based on its proven track record of working with local farmers through its robust extension services.

Dr Olatunji disclosed that as part of the Department's responsibility to nurture Cooperatives in the agricultural sector, it set up an Outreach Village Project in concert with Rumuekini women group to disseminate information on modern agricultural trends, adding that the programme has since been expanded to embrace other women faring groups. "We also interact with the community by training farmers on different areas of agriculture, such as snailry and fisheries. Our students also learn from the rural farmers as part of efforts to translate classroom theory into practical field experiences.

On his plans for running the Department, Dr Olatunji said, "I intend to bring a change in the manner our students do their Industrial Training under the Student Industrial Work Experience Scheme (SIWES)", expressing dissatisfaction with the current job description of the students. The Acting Head of Department, who regretted that what students from the Department engage in was not relevant, as he plans to restructure their field experience to give them proper hands-on skills. "I want our students to visit the Agricultural Development Programme (ADP), to enable them have an insight of activities that go on in the organization. When they return, they can combine the theoretical aspects of the business with practical

agricultural insight", he added.

"We want them to study the organogram of the ADP, interact with the extension agents and other staff of the organization. I want them to be able to analyze feasibility studies, data techniques and also acquire skills in marketing and analyzing farm enterprises in terms of profitability and prepare farm records", he disclosed, stating that he also wants to ensure that students can publish their projects on graduation.

He called on Management of the University to dislodge illegal business operators, who he said are disrupting the activities of the Department, making it difficult for staff to work in an enabling environment.



n advancement of the University's bid to attract support from its diverse stakeholders, the Department of History and Diplomatic Studies has recently received a steady stream of book donations to help improve the standard of teaching and research. Making the disclosure to UNIPORT Weekly, Acting Head of the Department, Dr Atei Okorobia, said that the Department has attracted such book donations from its Alumni and divers stakeholders as a result of recent mobilization of support from staff, students and alumni. He said that the response was indicative of the willingness of individuals and groups to support the Department to enable it render improved service delivery.

Dr Okorobia disclosed that recently, a graduate student, Mr Saturday Okanodor, on behalf of his colleagues in the African History and Development Studies, donated office furniture worth N800, 000.00 to the Department, while an out-going Bachelor's Student, Chinedum Isaac, also donated 33 books worth N114,000. Other donations received by the Department include: 30 books from the undergraduates U2008 Set worth N151,953, U2009 Set, 59 books and journals worth N52,000, as well as U2010 Set, which donated 35 books worth N145,950.



ment also received donations from Professor Adaye Orugbani, Professor Ben Naanen, Professor Ozo-Mekuri Ndimeie, Professor Abiye Derefaka, Professor John Enemugwem and Dr Atei Okorobia, which he said have contributed to lifting the academic tone of the Department.

Other donations were received from Mr David Okeokoh, Mrs Basil Uzoma Ugochukwu, Mr Jeremiah Mbadiwe and Mr Okachukwu Ebere. He said that the Department now has a Library that is well-stocked with current books and journal, adding that the challenge was that of space to stock the books, as well as provision of other facilities that would create a conducive learning environment.

The Acting Head of Department also stressed the need to engage more academic staff to take up the enormous academic work in the Department, particularly in the Graduate programme. various Departments, the University-Wide Accreditation Committee has submitted its report to authorities of the University.

Making the presentation to the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, Chairman of the Committee, Professor Sylvanus Udoidem, said that the Committee embarked on local resource verification to ensure that all the basic requirements for the various Departments that are due for accreditation were met before the actual exercise by the National Universities Commission (NUC), adding that a total of 48 Departments were visited and their needs assessed. He said that the aim of submitting the Report was to ensure that preparations should commence in earnest, thanking the Vice-Chancellor for constituting such a Committee with dedicated and active members, despite the challenges they faced in the process of completing the assignment.

Receiving the Report Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who commended members of the Committee for embarking on such a very important assignment, said that the submission was timely as the Governing Council had scheduled an Emergency Meeting, where the Report would be presented for deliberation.

He advised them to also embark on postaccreditation monitoring to ensure that equipment put in place in the various Departments were effectively utilized. "We need to have proper documentation of all the things we put in place, as well as have proper inventory of all the things on ground, so that we can be in a position to assess how well we have used what we have already put in place," he stated.

Agriculture Organisation...2012, estimated that total fish imports exceeded USD 100 billion in 2008. The value of exports was placed a little lower at USD 99.5 million. Of this figure, approximately half originated from developing countries, while approximately 80% of world imports went to the developed countries.

"Fish plays an important role in global food supplies and its demand is expected to increase considerably as living standards increase in Asia and population grows in Africa," he pointed out. He listed control of fishing fleets, enforcing limits on catches, stakeholder participation, technology transfer and community awareness, as key factors in the drive to establish good fisheries governance, recommending monitoring of fisheries, control and surveillance, protection of fish stocks from environmental degradation, adoption of traditional approaches to fish conservation,

reduction of waste, introduction of value-added products, amongst others, as remedial measures against rapid stock depletion.

The Inaugural Lecturer, whose research interest and contributions to knowledge covers such areas as enhancement of Aquacultural production, environmental pollution and degradation and assessment of fish stocks, disclosed that his current research centres on evaluation of pollution trends in the coastal waters of Nigeria, assessment of aquatic ecosystem integrity in the Niger Delta basin, studies on utilisation of nuisance aquatic resources for wealth creation, amongst others. Sikoki, who is the National Coordinator of the Federal Government of Nigeria Project RAF/7009 on Marine Pollution Monitoring and Seafood Safety, under the auspices of the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA), observed that some seafood, are not safe for human consumption, on account of their excessive exposure to radioactive substances that endanger human health, citing water snail and shrimps as examples of marine species that are receptive to pollutants.

In his remarks, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who expressed delight at the quality of the presentation, described Professor Sikoki as a fine scholar. "He is an example of the kind of scholars the University is advocating to have in every Department. We would like to encourage him to move from research to development. Some of his research work could be converted to marketable products in line with our vision to capitalize knowledge that would benefit both the researcher and society", the Vice-Chancellor said.

The Vice-Chancellor, who noted that Professor Sikoki's Lecture was the first in 2013; the first to come from the newly-created College of Natural and Applied Sciences, and the first from the emergent Faculty of Biological Sciences, described it as one of the best-attended Inaugural Lectures in the University.

even months after Trend Media City (TMC), owners of Trend Cable TV, and authorities of the University of Port Harcourt began to work out plans for collaboration in establishing a world-class Film Academy, both parties have sealed the pact with the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) aimed at actualizing the mega project.

Speaking at the signing ceremony, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, said that the proposal and opportunities presented by TMC was in tune with the vision of the University, re-stating the willingness of the authorities to play their own part to achieve the essence of the

collaboration. He said that the policy of the University was to ensure that all partnerships brought mutual benefits to interest groups.

Professor Ajienka, who said that the University was engaged in various partnerships with industry and other professional bodies, stated that the Institution was the first in Nigeria to outline a clearly stated mission to be an Entrepreneurial University, adding that to achieve this, research must be very active in order to add value to the society. The Vice-Chancellor said that the proposition by TMC's proposal fits clearly into
