s conflicts continue to engulf parts of the world, business mogul, Alhaji Bamanga Tukur, has described trade as a motivating factor that can reduce poverty and bring people together if properly harnessed. Alhaji Tukur made the observation during the foundation-laying ceremony of the Bamanga Tukur Institute of International Trade and Development in the University, penultimate Saturday.

The President of the African Business Roundtable, who noted that trade and education go together said: "for development we need peace, and for us to achieve peace we need development. If we don't have development, we will not have peace and if we don't have peace there will be no development," adding

that "business is good for politics, politics is good for business and I am a student of both."

He recalled that when he was working with the Nigerian Ports Authority, the first place he worked as a management staff was Bonny, Rivers State in 1959, adding that he was again posted to Port Harcourt immediately after the Nigeria civil war. He stated that his association with the State had made him feel at home in Port Harcourt since then. Tukur, who is National Chairman of the ruling Peoples' Democratic Party (PDP), hoped that the new Institute would strive hard to achieve the lofty aims and objectives for which it was set up, pledging total support towards its

speedy completion.

Also speaking, Minister of Education, Professor Ruqayyatu Rufa'i, who represented the Visitor to the University, President Goodluck Jonathan at the 29th Convocation Ceremony, commended Alhaji Tukur and Management of the University for collaborating on the Institute, expressing hope that other well-meaning individuals and corporate organizations would emulate the kind gesture of Alhaji Tukur by contributing towards the development of the educational sector through similar intervention projects.

Chief Wike also laid the foundation stone for the Faculty of Social Sciences which was named after renowned Social Scientist and Human Rights Crusader, late Professor Claude Ake and the Department of Animal and Environmental Biology, named after noted Marine Biologist, Bruce Powell, respectively.

Professor Ajienka observed that the projects would help the University immensely, promising to visit the site regularly to ensure that the stipulated timeframe for the completion of the projects is met. He charged all those directly concerned with the projects to visit the sites and give him regular reports from each site. When completed, the Faculty of Law will have two wings, while the Faculty of Social Sciences will have three structures, comprising 36 lecture halls, a 400-seater Auditorium, Information Communication Technology (ICT) Centre, Offices for Heads of Department, restaurant and shops, disclosing that the stipulated average timeframe for the completion of the project is 44 weeks.

In her speech, Wife of the late Senior Advocate of Nigeria, Mrs Judith Nwanodi, recalled the contributions her husband made to the advancement of the legal profession in Nigeria, expressing delight that his ideals have finally been recognized by the University. She thanked the authorities for remembering and honouring her late husband.

Chukwudi Ake, also expressed satisfaction over the decision to immortalize his father, disclosing that the University of Port Harcourt would always remain Unique in the memory of the Ake household, since his siblings are all Alumni of the Institution, where the Late Professor Ake taught political theory for many years.


Varsities Critical To National Dev ~*Anya*

Iniversities are critical in the social and economic development of nations and through their teachings, they prepare the next generation of leaders while research and public advocacy create the environment and instrument for social and economic advancement of each country.

Renowned scholar and social thinker, Professor Anva

O. Anya, made the assertion while delivering the 29th Convocation Lecture of the University titled: "The Idea and Uses of the University in the 21st Century",

can develop their national technology.

"Manufacturing which is the driver of economic prosperity in industrial nations depends on the scientific and technological education of citizens which provides a reservoir of human capital dependent on the skills, expertise and competencies of the citizens to drive new ideas of creativity and innovation that confer a competitive advantage on the nation," he explained.

Anya, who observed that "until the 1980s, the standards and performance of the Nigerian university system compared favourably with those of the best universities," regretted that the recently published Needs Assessment Report of the Nigerian university system makes dismal reading. "From under-provision of financial resources to underdevelopment of the needed infrastructure and the lack of trained manpower, particularly teachers, is one of criminal neglect," he pointed out.

"You must always remember that just as there are myriads of problems facing our country and challenging her leadership, there are also many opportunities for the prepared mind with willingness to excel and chart a new course for the individual, for the nation and for mankind," the Convocation Lecturer advised the new graduates, expressing joy that many Nigerian youths are excelling within and outside the country, despite the "apparent squalor and dispiriting environment of their present circumstances.

"Despite the discouraging signs, the challenge is clear: discover your mission, as an individual and as a new generation of hope, embrace it with renewed vision, vigour and vitality. In the 21st century, nothing is impossible to the willing and the prepared mind. The new Nigeria of our dreams depends on you and beckons on you with the conditionality—get a good education," Anya charged them, adding: "that is why fixing the university system must be the number one priority."

Earlier in his opening remarks, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who described the Lecture as an important aspect of the Convocation Ceremony, expressed delight that the Lecturer drew attention of the audience to the role of universities in nation building. Describing Professor Anya as a gift to the academia and the larger society, the Vice-Chancellor appealed to policy makers to make haste to rescue the tertiary educational system from the unacceptable situation in which it currently finds itself if the country hopes to join the comity of nations that are moving forward.

Speaking as Chairman of the occasion, former National President of the Nigerian Bar Association (NBA), Mr Onueze Okocha, lauded the Lecturer and congratulated the University on the successful foundation-laying ceremony for a new Faculty of Law, promising that as Chairman of the Council on Legal Education, he would assist the University in actualizing its vision of owning a world-class Law Faculty, "I will ensure that we come and inspect the Faculty when it is ready and accredit it for your new Faculty of Law programme to commence without further delay," the legal luminary told the audience. Also speaking, Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Chairman of the Convocation Committee, Professor Igho Joe, who recalled that the Lecturer taught him during his undergraduate days, commended him for an insightful lecture. "You have told us what a university should be and what went wrong in the nation's university system and the way forward," he said, thanking the 2nd and 5th Vice-Chancellors, Professor Sylvanus Cookey and Emeritus Professor Nimi Briggs, as well as the current Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ajienka, for their efforts in developing the University over the years. Attention should focus on conflicts between local communities and companies operating in the region", he advised.

The Visitor, who condemned the mob killing of four students of the University at Omuokiri, Aluu, last October, sympathized with parents and guardians of the deceased, as well as the entire University community over the unfortunate incident, assuring all stakeholders that such a horrendous crime will not be allowed to happen on any Nigerian Campus again.

Dr Jonathan commended the Governing Council, Management, Senate, Staff and Students of the University for the great strides that have been made to take the Institution to higher academic heights, advising the graduates to "hold steadfast to the



Chair in International Trade and Development, He also announced a donation of N10 million to support the take-off of the Bamanga Tukur Institute for International Trade and Development. Earlier in his address, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, said that the Senate worked tirelessly to ensure best practises in teaching and learning, adding that it also restructured some Faculties, Schools and Institutes for greater efficiency. The Vice-Chancellor disclosed that "the University took a holistic review of all our curricular to include the UNESCO-advocated concept of Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) and entrepreneurial education, as well as a review of the Statement of Academic Policies for undergraduate and graduate programmes", expressing delight over lifting the suspension on admission into the Medical School by the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria (MDCN).

Highlights of the event were the conferment of Honorary Doctorate Degrees on distinguished Historian, Professor Tekena Tamuno, Patron of the Arts, Prince Yemisi Shyllon, as well as President of the International Association of Athletics Federations (IAAF), Dr Lamine Diack. First and Higher degrees were also awarded to total of 6, 938 persons.

A breakdown of the statistics indicate that 468 graduated from the Faculty of Humanities, 197 from the Faculty of Social Sciences, 112, from the Faculty of Biological Sciences, 142, from the Faculty of Chemical Sciences, 219 from the Faculty of Physical Sciences and Information Technology, while the College of Health Sciences produced 351 graduates, including 208 Medical Doctors.

The School of Science Laboratory Technology produced a total of 309 graduates, while the Faculties of Education produced 527 graduates, Engineering 242, Management Sciences, 172, and Agriculture produced 172 graduates. 1,581 were awarded Master's Degree, while 149 were conferred with the Doctor of Philosophy Degree. A further breakdown of the statistics shows that 1,648 received the University's certificates from 12 Departments in the Faculties of Humanities and Education

ermanent Secretary, Federal Ministry of Water Resources, Ambassador Godknows Igali, has stressed the need for an integrated approach to water development in the Niger Delta with the cooperation of relevant stakeholders, including the private sector and international donors.

Igali, while delivering the 2st Founders Day Lecture titled: "Optimizing Water and Agricultural Potentials of the Niger Delta; Role of University of Port Harcourt and its Alumni, at the Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, University Park, penultimate Wednesday, noted that the approach would integrate fresh water mapping of the entire Niger Delta basin into the water supply development programme to be coordinated by the new Centre for Water Resources Technology in the University.

The distinguished pioneer Alumnus, who also advocated building of regional water schemes around the bigger metropolis, recommended leveraging on available resources to support water and sanitation, solar-based packaged water treatment systems and repair of broken down facilities, as practical measures to tackle inefficient water production in the Niger Delta, which he said offers a natural flood plain with best conditions for agricultural development. "This University should take the lead in agriculture and water resources research", he added, promising that his Ministry would support such

President of the Nigerian Bar Association, Mr Okey Wali, who chaired the event, congratulated members of the Alumni Association for identifying with their Alma Mater in addition to contributing to her development. "Nothing can be better than addressing issues affecting the Niger Delta. A Lecture like this projects the positive image of the region which has suffered years of neglect and negative recognition arising from militancy, oil bunkering and kidnapping", he said, describing the

region as the treasure base of the nation that deserves better attention from the Federal Government.

In his address, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, observed that as part of efforts aimed at exploring the abundant natural resources of the region, the University established the Institute of Natural Resources and Environmental Sustainability (INRES) and the Centre for Disaster Risk Management and Environmental Studies (CDRMES), to tackle the challenges of managing the region's abundant resources. "Factors that affect the vast water resources of the region also threaten its vast agricultural potentials in the

long run", he added. Deputy Vice-Chancellor and Chairman of the Convocation Committee, Professor Igho Joe, commended the University Management for setting aside 6th February every year as Founders' Day and the Alumni Association for identifying with the University, urging the Association to continue to raise issues that would contribute to national development and their Alma mater.

Weather Forecast Is

Not About Exact

Time ~Wekpe

s a way of enlightening members of staff, students and other residents of the University and neighbouring communities on the dynamics of weather conditions to enable them plan events ahead of time with a view to initiating precautionary measures, staff of the Weather Observatory Unit domiciled in the Department of Geography and Environmental Management commenced weather forecast last November.

Speaking to UNIPORT Weekly penultimate Monday, Mr Vremudia Wekpe, who prepares the Weather Observatory Report, said the forecast is crucial to researchers, agriculturists, airline operators and event managers to enable them make plans to contain unforeseen contingencies.

Mr Wekpe disclosed that "the Centre is equipped by the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) and some concerned Alumni to carry out studies on early warning system on weather conditions."

revealing further that

NEMA's interest

was informed by the recent disaster hit t parts of t he country.

He stated that the Unit currently partners the Nigerian Meteorological Agency (NIMET) in Omagwa Centre, and

the Headquarters in Lagos.

Responding to a question on the authenticity of his forecast, he said that "Meteorology is the science of the moment, and forecast is not about exact time, because of factors such as climatic change that may affect it. And since it is reported weekly, it becomes difficult to make changes."

"The Centre for Weather Observatory in the University of Port Harcourt is seeking manpower in order to cover the Day and Night weather changes, in addition to more equipment to enhance research," Vremudia disclosed, adding that the Centre is supervised by Climatologists. The basic aim of the forecast is to serve the University Community through the UNIPORT Weekly by providing an avenue to plan ahead of time. "My colleagues and I will soon be sending the online edition of our fore cast to the Information

and Communication

Technology Centre, (ICTC)," he promised.
