s a way of fast-tracking the campaign for gender equity through the National Affirmative Action Initiative, the First Lady of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Dame Patience Jonathan, commissioned a Centre for Gender and Women Development Studies in the University, last Tuesday.


Represented at the inauguration by the Special Assistant to the President on Millennium Development Goals (MDGs), Dr Precious Gbeneol, the

First Lady expressed hope that the Patience Jonathan Centre for Gender and Women Development Studies (PJC-GWDS) would empower women to develop potentials that would enable them contribute meaningfully to the socio-economic development of

The First Lady, who regretted that negligence, abandonment, violence and discrimination, characterized the daily life of a typical Nigerian woman, called for the abolition of harmful traditional beliefs and value systems that impede women's right and development. In line with this year's theme of the International Women's Day, which advocated an end to violence against women, she called for concerted efforts to promote active participation of women in the society to guarantee accelerated national development.

Speaking on the topic: National Universities Commission: Strategies for Women Development in Nigeria, Executive Secretary of the Commission, Professor Julius Okojie, who spoke through a one-time Vice-

Elechi Amadi, Writer-In-Residence, Launches Short Story Book In UN

"With the presentation of this impressive collection of short stories today, Elechi Amadi is doing what a Writer-in-Residence is expected to do. I believe that celebrating a Writer of Amadi's fame is very important on account of his immense contributions to African and world literatures", Nduka observed, pointing out that Amadi's central theme had been focused on "an attempt by man to wrestle with the values of his traditional and cultural environment".

He commended Amadi for taking up the challenge of mid-wifing the writings of younger authors, which he said, showed continuity in his career as an established writer.

Welcoming guests to the event, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, commended Chief Amadi for his immense contributions to the growth of African Literature, and for also grooming a new generation of writers, describing creative writers as "a blessing to any society as they delight and instruct us on life's many twists and turns. Creativity is a high gift of the Almighty to individuals that calls for celebration in any society". Advising emerging writers to learn the necessary skills and draw inspiration from established authors, Professor Ajienka showered praises on Chief Amadi for his first public outing as a Writer-in-Residence in the University, promising that the authorities would support publication of works by the Writers-in-Residence that were appointed in 2011, including those of younger authors that may be associated with them.

Launching the book, former Secretary to the Rivers State Government, Chief Sampson Agbaru, urged young people to cultivate reading habit despite the craze for the social media, urging the University to continue to provide leadership in the propagation of cultural values and academic focus in line with its core mandate.

Earlier, Chief Amadi had described the collection as "a source of joy to me and to all those who appreciate creativity. The fact that all the contributors are products of the Elechi Amadi School of Creative Writing partially answers the age-long question: "Can creative writing be taught in a formal classroom setting?" Conceding that the potential writer must possess talent that could be cultivated in a formal setting, Amadi said that "modern writing called for much more than mere ability to tell good stories". He commended the Vice-Chancellor for encouraging the arts in the University, advising younger writers to take up the challenge thrown by the University administration.

Reviewing the work, a Lecturer in the Department of English Studies, Seiyifa Koroye, said the stories have key features that recommend them to the reader. "They combine magical realism and mystery that lurk below the surface. Drug addiction, recklessness of youth, love and betrayal and simplicity of plot structure and character delineation run through most of the tales contained in the collection", Koroye told the audience, stressing that some of the stories take on thriller form such as trials, tribulations, self-willed misery and family intrigues, amongst others. "Writers always want a personal agency to emerge in their story", the reviewer said, urging young writers to take another look at their manuscripts before rushing to publishing houses.



On his study habit, Iserhien said: "I spend a minimum of two and a maximum of five hours studying daily. I do not believe in reading in the Library; I can read anywhere, so long as it is conducive for reading."

Responding to a question on his lifestyle, Iserhien, who admitted being deficient in living life on the fast lane, prefers to concentrate on his academics instead. Senator Chukwumerije, who made the remark when the Committee visited the University, at the Governing Council Chambers, on a fact-finding mission, penultimate Thursday, commended the strong collaborations between the University and other the industry, saying that such partnerships, especially with foreign professional bodies have the potential of producing quality graduates, who can compete favourably in the competitive global market.

The Committee Chairman, who promised to make strong advocacy to relevant Ministries and governmental agencies for more funds to be released to the University to sustain its developmental strides, charged the authorities to also source funds outside statutory allocations to carry out research and finance developmental projects, disclosing that the Committee has identified over 20 sources of funds to assist higher institutions raise their Internally-Generated

Revenue (IGR) up to 25 per cent to meet their budgetary needs.

In a power-point presentation, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who accounted for the 2012 Budget Implementation and Capital Grant Performance for the past three years, enumerated the University's areas of strength which included its exploits in Sports, Medicine, Petroleum and Gas Engineering and quality research, lamenting that paucity of funds and encroachment by land speculators were some of the major challenges facing the University.

"We currently have over 30 Professorial Chairs to drive research in partnership with foreign institutions, industry and professional bodies. For the first time, we are going into film production to also generate income for the University. There is a Pilot-plant Laboratory for paint production and lots more, but each time any project is to be sited in the University, we pay through our noses to our host

communities. We have lost over 52 per cent of our original land to the host communities due to non-payment of compensation by the Federal Government. I wish to report that land poses serious problems to us as the situation also portends grave security threat to staff and students," Professor Ajienka said. "Urgent measures must be put in place to address the issue of land compensation to host communities, while

address staff and students' accommodation problems. We also plead that more staff be supported in the Staff Development Programme of the Tertiary Education Trust Fund (TETFund)," the Vice-Chancellor suggested, stressing the need to build more functional laboratories, class-rooms and offices, as well as improve electricity supply to the University to enable staff and students engage in meaningful research in an enabling environment. Other Committee Members on the trip were Senators Atiku Bagudu, Sonni Ogbuoji, Joshua Dariye, Babayo Gamawa and Pius Ewherido. Others were the Committee Clerk, Mr Felix Orumwense and his Deputies, Ahmed Lawal and Ayoh Ogon. Also on the entourage were Franca Mbah and Pauline Ogwokhademhe. Culture Envoy Advocates Diaspora Studies In African Varsities At Composers' Summit

takeholders in the educational sector have been called upon to institutionalize Diaspora studies in the curricula of African universities as a means of forging closer ties between the continent and Africans living in the Diaspora to preserve the Black Identity in the age of globalization. Participants at the maiden Africa Composers' Summit, tagged: "From Indigenous to Modern: Africa Music Composition", convened by the Department of Music, also canvassed the need for African Scholars to engage their counterparts in the Diaspora in regular dialogue that would result in common position on the Black Condition during the event held at the Theatre Arts Lecture Hall, on Thursday, 28° February, 2013.

Delivering a Lead paper titled: "Diaspora and Homelands: An emerging Central Theme in African Cultural and Historical Studies", an erudite Historian and Culture Ambassador, Professor Okon Uya, disclosed that there is no reason why the African Diaspora should not occupy a central position in the curricular of Secondary Schools and institutions of higher learning on the African continent, advocating that "African Studies in our Universities should not be complete or comprehensive until we are able to incorporate the vital aspects of our heritage into our curriculum, teaching and research".

Professor Uya, who was a one-time, Deputy Vice-Chancellor at University of Calabar, explained that to encourage African Diaspora studies, there was the urgent need to involve the African Diaspora host communities in the activities of African diplomatic missions, including mobilization of expertise and capital, stressing the need to have an explicit African Diaspora component in the conception and implementation of Nigeria's diplomacy.

The Guest Lecturer regretted that "without a credible strategy and political will to improve the performance of our democratic project, we will not succeed in attracting Nigerians in the Diaspora and others to invest their talent, expertise capital and other human resources in development efforts", warning that the current phase of the African Diaspora project was bound to fail without good governance on the continent. He further stressed the need to improve the management of Africa's fragile democracy, recalling that in 1977, Nigeria hosted the African Festival of Arts and Culture (FESTAC), which dramatized the global dimensions of the African experience and its crucial role for the resolution of the cultural and identity crises that had bedeviled the African world, lamenting that there has been no sustained effort to convert these concerns to concrete educational and cultural programmes, despite the commendable initiatives of the Centre for Black and African Arts and Civilization

Friday April 19, 2013, adding that classes would begin on Monday, April 19, 2013.

For the Effective Writing Skills course, admission is open to candidates, who seek to improve on their writing skills, including staff, students, as well as candidates preparing for public examinations conducted by the West African Examination Council (WAEC) and the Universal Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) amongst others.

"Our business is to assist the candidates at every stage in their development as writer through highly intensive workshops organised at the Basic, Intermediate and Advanced levels," the statement said, adding that applicants for Effective Writing Skills programme are exempted from screening test.

Meanwhile, prospective candidates have been advised to complete application forms at the Institute of Arts and Culture, Delta Park with a non-refundable fee of N5,000, with a bank draft made payable to the Institute, obtainable from U & C Microfinance Bank, University of Port Harcourt through Account Number: 1528022894.


Gbosi Joins ECOWAS-EU Partnership

the European Union with the aim of reducing poverty in the West African subregion.





Gbosi, who further disclosed that the final draft of the Agreement was signed at the last meeting of the Commission which held from the 20th to 22th of February in Accra, Ghana, advised West African countries to design sound macro-economic policies that would enable them achieve the desired result stated in the partnership Agreement. "Apart from the inflow of foreign capital into the sub-region as a result of the EPA, trade has always been identified as a unifying factor, but we need functional democracies and stable political environments in the ECOWAS sub-region to attain beneficial economic growth people of the region and the rest of Africa", he said.

taff and students engaged in various forms of research have been advised to add value to their work by focusing on projects that are capable of solving the societal problems and yielding profit for researchers. Former Director-General of the National Research Institute for Chemical Technology and Research, Abuja, Professor Ebenezer Okonkwo, gave the advice in an interview with UNIPORT Weekly, penultimate Tuesday.

Professor Okonkwo, who described his coming to the University as a joyful experience, said that his experience in development-based research would be brought to bear in his new assignment. "With the experience I am bringing from my previous establishment, and having developed the enterprise research mind-set, it has been my desire to develop the enterprise brand of research in the University", Okonkwo said, adding that most universities are focussed on research without considering the

with Research Institutes under the Federal Ministry of Science and Technology to forge partnerships that would yield mutual benefits. We have so far signed Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with relevant Institutes in furtherance of the goal of bringing industry and university players to work together to achieve our purpose in establishing the Technology Park", adding that he was also in consultation with the National Board for Technology (NBT) on the possibility of establishing a Business Incubation Centre in the University.

"When the Centre is fully established, it would help the Technology Park to secure both the knowledge for establishing an Incubation Centre and also generate more funds to guarantee its growth and continuity", he assured the stakeholders.

Professor Okonkwo identified epileptic power supply as a major problem retarding quality research in the University, regretting that the prevailing situation leads to frustration and cannot encourage sustainable research. "For there to be meaningful progress in research activities here, the problem of power supply has to be tackled headlong", he said, stressing the need to form research groups to handle specific projects.

"This is the best approach, if we are to develop meaningful research. Inter-disciplinary research should be encouraged so that useful research results can be obtained by participants. My experience here so far shows that the Faculty workforces are enthusiastic in carrying out research activities if given the enabling environment. The next step now is to harness the needed expertise to drive the process. The non-availability of relevant equipment is a challenge to researchers in the University", he stated.

Professor Okonkwo said that "with its current profile, the University has the capacity to be one of the best in Africa. This is because the capacity to achieve the feat is very much in the Institution", he stated, adding: "I see the University as a reference point in areas such as Sports Technology, Petroleum and Gas Engineering and Medicine. Now that we have excelled and become recognised in competitive sports, it is a great window of opportunity for the University to exploit this advantage by bringing in the appropriate technology for the manufacture of sporting equipment".

The avid researcher, who disclosed that he was assigned to develop the Technology Park as part of the University's plan to capitalize academic research, urged his colleagues to see the venture as a major component of the entrepreneurial drive of the University.

Professor Okonkwo said that the output of the industry is contract research, consulting, through commercialization of research results, generation of spin-offs and eventual establishment of profitoriented companies, noting that the University could raise critically-needed funds by applying for grants in cash or kind to pursue the vision.

"We would like to work on specific projects to assess how Lecturers and Students can imbibe the emergent enterprise vision, so that the University would not depend solely on budgetary allocations from the Federal Government to run its affairs in future. We have to think out of the box. It is my desire to help the authorities bring the University onto the platform of capitalizing our research endeavours for the benefit of society and the researchers", Okonkwo said.

On his strategy to achieve the vision, the former Director-General said: "I have been networking

Nwafor Calls For Health Assessment for oil-bearing communities as recommended in the contentious Petroleum Industry Bill (PIB) now before the National Assembly. "Through this Lecture, I have

Sciences in the College of Health Sciences, has called for the establishment of a Health Assessment Centre in the Niger Delta to serve as a physio-medicinal facility to tackle pollution-related ailments in the region and the rest of the country.

Nwafor, who made the call while delivering the 102 Inaugural Lecture titled: "Life Under Assault: Nowhere To Hide", at the Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, last Thursday, said that such a Centre would properly evaluate harmful substances in the environment to ascertain their potential health effects on human and animal species.

When established, "the Centre would also organise workshops to address the environmental challenges besetting the region," the Inaugural Lecturer said, calling on government at all levels and corporate organisations to adequately fund research endeavours aimed at reducing the disease burden in oil-producing areas of the country.

In view of the rising cases of environmentally-related health challenges in the Niger Delta, Nwafor stressed the "need to address the unrivalled fundamental etiologic, anti-environmentally-related drug development, lifestyle modification, disease, treatment and complication control, as well as explore collaborative opportunities and utilize emerging technologies to combat assaults on the environment as a result of unregulated industrial activities by multinational firms operating in the area."

Decrying the volume of harmful chemicals that humans are exposed to in the Niger Delta region, Nwafor revealed that women are more vulnerable to diseases caused by such exposures than their male counterparts, describing some of those ailments as petroleum diseases.

The Professor of Human Physiology, who condemned unregulated consumption of traditional medicines, especially by pregnant women, stated that such practice may result in stillbirths and babies with defects, pointing out that most of such local drugs are not usually subjected to relevant scientific scrutiny

before they are advertised for human consumption.

"What must be understood is that the claims of these
nutritional supplements may not be supported by
properly supervised scientific research, while the
traditional physicians and patients may not have any

I am aware that women in the Niger Delta suffer from Arthritis more than their counterparts in other parts of the country,", he observed, tasking Scholars to investigate the causes of the alarming rate of diseases among

idea of the physiological and pharmacological reactions of such natural medicines in their bid to ameliorate health problems," he pointed out.

In his remarks, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, noted that "it is humans who cause the assaults on the environment identified by the Lecturer.

It is also humans who want to hide from the consequences of those assaults; so, we have to bear the consequences of our actions as we relate to the environment that has been well ordered by the Creator", stressing the need for humans to imbibe the culture of safeguarding their environment to make it more habitable.

The Vice-Chancellor also noted that the Lecture has justified the need to implement the 10 per cent royalty women in the region.

Professor Ajienka, who regretted that the operation of illegal refineries is worsening the case of environmental pollution in the Niger Delta, charged the Inaugural Lecturer and other researchers to work towards commercialisation of results of their findings. Reacting to the Lecture, Visiting Scholar, Professor Vincent Idemyor, observed that the topic touched on various areas such as health and environment which are crucial to human wellbeing. In his observation, Director, Centre for Refining and Petro-chemicals at the Institute of Petroleum Studies, Professor Godwin Igwe, recommended reduction of the duration of Inaugural and Public Lectures in the University for better delivery.
