

# hy Our Roads Fail ~*Beredugo*

ne of the developmental challenges besetting parts of Nigeria, especially the Niger Delta region and the South East is lack of good road network. Professor Youpele Beredugo is a veteran Civil Engineer, who spoke to our Correspondent, HUMPHREY OGU, on this and other issues concerning the construction

Nigeria does not recognize the potentials in the utilization of engineering manpower. We seem to be looking outside for expertise that is available here in Nigeria. Most of the expatriates we engage come from temperate regions of the world and there is a tendency for them to impose what is suitable in their own environment on us," Professor Beredugo noted.

Beredugo cited improper management of asphalt as the main reason for the collapse of roads in Nigeria, stating that when asphalt is laid hot, roads are bound to fail, "But in the Nigerian situation, asphalt is simply rolled over the roads and by the time such roads are put to use, they begin to fail. Now, there are different types of asphalt that can be laid cold to ensure the longevity of roads in this country," he disclosed.

The veteran Engineer, who noted that engineering is a universal practice, said: "We have to adapt such practices to particular locations and even at particular times. We should task our Faculties of Engineering and Engineering organizations to develop the types of asphalt that are suitable to our weather condition if we hope to construct roads that would last. We should not just borrow blindly from other places. We should domesticate technology by copying and developing materials that are suitable for our own needs," he noted. On what is being done to reverse road failures, Beredugo regretted that "there is very little individuals like us can do, except to preach, and like the preacher, we are preaching to the already converted. Those, who do not believe in Jesus Christ don't go to Church; so when the Pastor preaches, he is preaching to those who already believe. That is the problem we face in Nigeria today; we don't have access to those holding political power and we need visionary leaders with political will to change the parlous situation in the critical construction sector.


"We have the Council for Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria (COREN), which is doing its best, but there is a limit to what the body can achieve, because they do not award contracts," he explained, citing the example of the Indian Government which commissioned a small company that developed lifting equipment as a result of an embargo slammed on the country by the America during its border war with neighbouring Pakistan.

Beredugo, who noted that the small company has since become a very big firm, said: "If our government can assemble a small group of experts, give them similar assignment in an enabling environment, they will be surprised at what Nigerians can achieve.

"I am one of those to admit dissatisfaction with facilities that are currently obtainable in the various Faculties of Engineering in Nigerian universities, the distinguished Engineer said, regretting that "the facilities are very poor; Lecturers are doing what they can with what is available, but we need a lot of improvements to take training of students to where we all want it to be, not only in terms of quantity, but also in the quality of equipment used in training Engineers

"When students graduate from the University, they are awarded the Bachelor of Engineering Degree; that is just an Engineering Degree. They are supposed to have a lot of backup knowledge of working in the Laboratory and it is when they go out to practise that the real engineering challenges start to emerge," he

Beredugo, who was once acted as Dean of the Faculty of Engineering in the University, however said: "Fortunately, in spite of the poor

He dislikes lies, loves integrity and strongly believes that for there to be trust and peace, people should value integrity, as well as learn to understand and respect individual differences. vans Arugu is not your run-of-the-mill, everyday student. On first encounter, he exudes the mien of a Philosopher with the universal tool-kit to solve every problem facing humanity. Get a little closer and you come face-to-face with a man of iron will, who is very realistic about life and his role in it. For instance, when asked to explain his choice of University of Port Harcourt for Undergraduate studies, Arugu put it rather matter-offactly: "My initial intention was not to study in UNIPORT, despite the fact that it is one of the very good Universities in Nigeria and West Africa. This was because I had wanted to study Law, but I did not want to go to Lagos or Calabar. When I did not gain admission to study Law at Niger Delta University in Bayelsa State, I decided to come to UNIPORT to study Philosophy"

To Arugu, his choice of Philosophy was based on his personal experiences in life and his love of the subject, which some students approach with a combination of trepidation and curiosity. "Despite the fact that Philosophy was not my first choice, I have come to love the subject

because it encompasses every other subject and enables students to engage in critical thinking. In fact, I am deriving great joy studying Philosophy in Unique UNIPORT", Arugu told our Intern. He had lived a deta ched life on his own ter ms right from his First Year 4rugu

the Final Year, because he sees it as the only way to be at peace with himself. "My stay in UNIPORT has been good, although it has not been easy; but being a student of Philosophy, and approaching the subject as part of my daily experience has made my life different from others," he said. As a way of socializing, this lone ranger broke his own personal rule of solitude when he decided to join his colleagues from the Faculty of Humanities on a tour of Ghana last Semester. "I saw it as an opportunity to socialize with my mates, but then I found out that the life of a typical student in Ghana was not all that different from what I thought it was," he said, adding that the trip still turned out to be a good experience in the end.

On the difficulties he encounters as a student, Arugu said: The main difficulty had always been time management. I am a voracious reader and I have never missed a class from my First Year," he revealed, disclosing further that there were times when a few unserious students, who did not study as much as he did appeared to score better grades.

"Professor Iniobong Udoidem is my favourite lecturer. He taught me in my First Year that before we can even study Philosophy, we should throw away our conceit and open up our minds to a new horizon of life and learning. That alone greatly influenced me and also helped me approach Philosophy as a way of life, rather than as a strictly academic subject.

On his Library habit, Arugu said: "I use the Library only when I want to embark upon major research, although some students attribute their success to regular use of the Library, I do not go there on a regular basis because some of the critical books in my subject area are currently not available in the University Library. Arugu, who believes that the method of teaching in the University could be improved in many areas, said: "Lecturers are trying their best, but there should be reciprocal relationships between them and students to bring out the very best in both parties." His favourite course is Ethics because he had always considered himself to be a moral agent, which corresponds with his acetic way of life.

On his perception of the dress code in the University, Arugu said; "The mode of dressing amongst some students in UNIPORT is very terrible. This category of students does not know what it means to be fashionable," further advising them to adhere to the dress code of the University so as not to give room for sexual harassment.

On his opinion about the University's development, Arugu said; "I would not say that UNIPORT is developing optimally. We keep seeing office buildings, but we need more classrooms for students. Development is a process of social transformation in which individuals are positively affected. All I see are attributes of development and not development in itself." He also added that "UNIPORT is just beginning in comparison with some older Universities I have been to, but I strongly believe that we will compete with such institutions Nigeria and even in West Africa sooner than later."

On his opinion about Nigeria, his country, he said; "Nigeria is a beautiful country that has a problem of good governance. Although, our leaders have tried their best in the process of "nation-building", Nigerian Youths are still scared of what tomorrow holds for them. The Government should consider creating more job opportunities for the vouths as a priority."

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## **To Partner Plymouth University**

This was the outcome of a visit by representatives of Plymouth University to the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, penultimate Tuesday.

Marketing and Recruitment Consultant (West Africa), Stuart Renin, who said that Plymouth University had a rich background in actualizing collaborative ventures, disclosed that his team was in the University to establish a long and sustainable relationship, adding that they hoped to identify the objectives, mission and strategic policies of the University of Port Harcourt by fashioning out areas of mutual partnership for immediate implementation. According to him, Plymouth University has abundant expertise in such specialized areas as Marine Engineering, Geology and Transport, as well as disciplines that support the oil and gas industry, hoping that the envisaged collaboration would bring about mutual benefits to both institutions. Mr Renin, who also disclosed that Plymouth has the biggest Marine Centre in the world, observed that UNIPORT and his institution shared common features-an indication that both institutions could work together in specialized fields that are common features of their locations in the UK and Nigeria.

Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who welcomed the move to initiate a collaborative programme between the two institutions, assured the visiting delegation of his preparedness to midwife the project to the mutual satisfaction of both parties. "We have experience in running international collaborative programmes and I can assure you that this University will partnership within the stipulated timeframe. We are

pleased to be associated with a reputable institution like Plymouth and our desire is that the Exchange and Linkages Unit of our University would work with you to actualize all the necessary protocols in respect of the project", the Vice-chancellor told his guests.

Director, Exchange and Linkages Unit, Professor John Otaigbe, said that both institutions have similar objectives, pointing out that the University would be pleased to have students with global perspectives on issues of mutual cooperation tabled for discussion at the exploratory meeting. He said that the collaboration, which would ensure capacity-building and exchange of students of both institutions to a wide spectrum of activities in their various areas of specialization.

Earlier, International Office Student Ambassador of Plymouth University, Nigerian born Chinwendu Elenwa, had said that the team was in the University to seek areas of mutual partnership, adding that it would be of great interest to collaborate with the University to achieve collaborative programmes in both institutions.

At the end of the meeting, both universities agreed to enter into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to legally seal the pact on the emergent partnership.

# Provost Advises Medical Students At PUMSA Health Week ...As FHUSA Wins Inter-Faculty Debate

edical Students have been advised to prepare themselves to meet the onerous challenges of their profession if they hope to earn the trust and respect of the larger society. They have also been told to embrace emerging trends in the profession to enable them compete favourably with their counterparts in other parts of the world.

The Provost, who gave the advice at a lecture to mark the 2013 PUMSA Health Week at the Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, penultimate Tuesday, commended the students for initiating a medical outreach to sensitize their colleagues on how to prevent health problems peculiar to adolescents. Professor Akani, who commended the

sense of the ir reminded First Class preparation the ir programmes.

"The University has so much respect for the Medical School and so Medical Students need to work harder than other students to continue to earn such respect. Keep up the good habit and feel free to come to any member of staff or Dean of Students' Affairs, we are always willing to listen and counsel you as our children and wards," Professor Akani said, expressing joy that admission into the College would soon commence, following the lifting of suspension on the University's medical programme by the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria (MDCN).

Delivering a paper titled: "Youth Health Promotion: The Paradigm Shift From Regret to Prevention" Director, Institute of Maternal and Child Health, Professor Nwadiuto Akani, said that if regrets have to be a thing of the past, all hands have to be on deck as everybody, adults, youths, politicians, community leaders, traditional rulers, professionals and non-professionals alike have a role to play in efforts aimed at containing the spread of preventable diseases.

She added, "If we have to achieve our goals, we need to adopt certain strategies and we need to create the awareness that youths are actually the people at risk; these youths need help to be protected from the ills of the society so they can actualize their dreams. We need to

do some training, research, network and go into collaboration with organizations, we need to communicate and be well informed and get vital information that can assist the young people. We need to advocate for those in politics, Government, Non-Governmental Organization and those with resources to establish facilities that would help the young people to be empowered".

In her Presentation titled: "Managing a Family and a Medical Career", a Consultant in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology at the University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital, Dr Ngozi Orazulike said, "the Family is the bedrock of any nation, where children are nurtured to grow up as responsible adults", stating that in the family, children add a whole new responsibility and selflessness to one's life.

Dr Orazulike disclosed that to strike a balance with your career and family, as a student, you should choose a specialty that you have a passion for, stressing that "You need to marry your friend, think on your partner's career and ensure you always develop yourself in that area you are good at and never rest on your oars."

Earlier, President of PUMSA, David Briggs-Otto, said the Health Week is a 30 year-old tradition of the medical students, stating that, "Through this programme, we hope to reawaken the interest in preventive health in the society, especially the communities around us. We hope to sensitize our host communities through our rally, seminar, Health Talk health, Awareness Campaign. We are the work force generation and the leaders of tomorrow, we have to live responsibly."

In his contribution, Dean, Students Affairs, Professor Henry Bellgam who also praised the association for the initiative to sensitize the students in the community, urged them to keep up the good work, charging other Faculties and Colleges to emulate the Medical students. Responding on behalf of the Faculty of Humanities Students Association, after emerging winner in the Inter-Faculty Debate, which was part of the event, President of FHUSA, a student in the Department of History and Diplomatic Studies, Joseph Inyama said; "Humanities is the home of debate in University of Port Harcourt and plans are underway to hold our Melting Pot Intra-Department Debate as part of our week. He charged them to take their academic work seriously and always abide by the rules and regulations of the Institution by shunning societal ills, urging them to be God-fearing, security-conscious, honest and obedient.

In her welcome address, Registrar, Mrs Matilda Nnodim, who was represented by the Director, Personnel Affairs, Mr Roland Wabali, commended the students, charging them to always imbibe the virtues of hard-work, honesty and commitment to their studies. Mr Wabali disclosed that "before any student is awarded a Certificate, such a student must be found worthy both in character and in learning", advising them to make their parents and guardians proud by working hard now to ensure they graduate in good grades".

### Standard Evaluation Should Be Based On Process, Not Product ~Wokocha

Most of the debates on the Nigerian Educational system centre on whether or not the quality or "standards" (as it is called in some quarters) of education is falling. What is Teachers' Registration Council of Nigeria (TRCN), doing to ensure quality control in the teaching profession? These and many more questions were put to Registrar/Chief Executive Secretary, TRCN, Professor Addison Wokocha by our Correspondent, HUMPHREY OGU and Intern, HENRIETTA OTONNAH.

Professor Wokocha does not believe that there is anything like "falling standard of education" in the country as many people claim; neither does he accept the popular notion that products of the Nigerian educational system are of low quality.

Though Professor Wokocha concedes that there are students, whose academic performances are not quite impressive, he argues that there are also

"The problem is that when people talk about poor a c a d e m i c performance,

they are looking at the products and not the process. Until we look at the process, we cannot get a good product. If students are admitted into a school that has no facilities and qualified teachers and you keep pushing them till they get to the final year of study; of course, you will get poor products. So, you must look at the entire process—the system," he points out.

"There must be qualified teachers and facilities before you can expect qualitative education; it is through sound and qualitative education that you can have qualitative products. That is what we are advocating," the TRCN Registrar says, stressing that it is the educational system that determines qualitative or poor products.

Is he satisfied with the quality of products of the Nigerian educational system? "The term quality is relative. When you talk about quality education, we are talking of an educational system that addresses societal problems," Wokocha points out, asking: "Are our Medical Doctors not treating patients who recover from their ailments?

"Sometimes, when people go abroad for treatment, it is not the fault of medical practitioners back home; it is partly because government has not provided certain basic facilities for Doctors to work effectively. Under such a situation, one cannot blame the Doctors. A qualified teacher also needs requisite facilities and an enabling environment to function

optimally. Similarly, one cannot teach or study engineering without the appropriate equipment," Wokocha explains.

He laments that "our problem in this country is that we worry that children are unable to write and speak good English; but education cannot be equated with the ability to write and speak English. Education must be professionally relevant to one's environment, self-improvement and social development," adding: "There must be proper examination and pupils must do well before they can move to the next class as was the case in the past."

Does the TRCN Registrar believe in the assertion that some teachers are born? "There is no such thing, Are Medical Doctors born? Teaching is a profession and one of the conditions of being a professional is that there is rigorous training. So, no one is born a Teacher or a Medical Doctor. You acquire knowledge through education and training," he explains.

Wokocha, warns that "Until citizens recognize the subsisting legislation on teaching qualification and stop employing quacks, the problem of unqualified teachers in the system would continue," expressing joy that some of such quacks have started to adjust. "Many unqualified teachers have gone on to acquire such qualifications to make them eligible to teach," he adds.

He discloses that TRCN has been sensitizing the public on the need to have only qualified teachers in the system, adding: "I have applied to the Minister of Justice for a fiat to start prosecuting unqualified teachers in the system. It is going to be a gradual process because we lack facilities to handle all the defaulters at same time.

Bemoaning lawlessness in Nigeria, he advocates the appointment of professional teachers as Ministers; Commissioners in charge of Ministries of Education, just as only qualified Lawyers and Medical Doctors handle their respective Ministries.

## WOMEN ENROLMENT DRIVES DEMAND FOR TERTIARY EDUCATION

he Ministry of Higher Education in Saudi Arabia claims that there has

been a sharp growth in university enrollment largely because of an increase in the income levels of Saudi families and greater interest among women to pursue tertiary education.

World Bank figures suggest that the per capita income in Saudi Arabia climbed to SR 81,200 in 2011. A recent report of the Ministry for the 2011 academic year points out that university admissions have recorded an impressive growth rate of 10.3 percent annually. Although the income levels have increased, most of the academic institutions have offered "free" education.

The report also highlights that the number of young women seeking university degrees has also grown at a fast pace. During 2011,

women accounted for more than half of the total enrolled students at these institutions of higher learning. Their enrollment has improved significantly because of a "positive shift in the social stance toward women's education, women are getting more encouragement and new opportunities for education". The number of women enrolled in different university degree programs in the Kingdom is estimated at \$23,583.

Humanities and Arts majors remained the most popular among women, with around 209,000 women enrolled in these programs. Further, about 98,000 women chose to study Social Sciences, Business Management and Law. Technical subjects, like Engineering and Industrial Production courses, remained on the lower end of spectrum as only 9,000 women enrolled in these courses.
