UNIPORT, Wits Varsity To Partner On Oil & Gas Studi

he dominance of oil and gas studies by University of Port Harcourt across the African continent was confirmed last Thursday, when the Vice-Chancellor of Witwatersrand University, Johannesburg, Professor Loyiso Nongxa, led a high-powered delegation to explore areas of partnership that would facilitate oil and gas studies back at Wits.

Both Universities are to partner in Petroleum Engineering through a splitsite programme for Doctoral candidates, amongst other areas of mutually-beneficial partnerships. To

speedily achieve the aims and objectives of the emergent partnership, relevant organs of both institutions have been mandated to work out the institutional framework to formalize the joint venture agreements to kickstart the programme.

Receiving the guests, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who described UNIPORT as one of the premier universities in the Niger Delta region with a population of about 30,000 Undergraduate and 4,000 Graduate students, told his guests that the University is a Centre of Excellence in Petroleum and Gas Engineering, Geosciences, Theatre and Film Studies, Music, Medical Sciences, Sports, Biotechnology and Bio-resources, Ethnic and Conflict Studies and Nomadic Education, expressing willingness to share experience with Wits.

Professor Ajienka also disclosed that the University was developing a Technology Park that would take research to the end users, an Arts Village and Legacy Centres, adding that the focus of the University was more on the oil and gas industry, given its strategic location in the Niger Delta region of Nigeria. He pointed out that internationalization of academic programmes at home was the key driver of his Administration's vision of building a world-class Entrepreneurial

UNIPORT Microbiologist Set To Commercialize Sclerotia

Some ethnic groups in Rivers State call it 'esu', almost the same with the Igbos who named it 'usu', but the scientific name is Sclerotia, mostly found in the soil. An Environmental Microbiologist, Researcher and Consultant, Dr Herbert Stanley, is undertaking a groundbreaking research aimed at producing the Sclerotia in commercial quantities for its nutritional and medicinal values, reports OTIKOR SAMUEL.

he Sclerotium mostly found in pleurotus tuberregium – a specie of mushroom, is spherical in nature, dark brown on the outside and white inside. Sclerotium, when soaked in water for some hours would peel off the dark brownish colour, thereby, exposing the whitish inner tissue which can substitute in part or whole for the melon seeds, said Dr Stanley in an interview with UNIPORT Weekly in his office, penultimate Wednesday.

"Pleurotus tuberregium initially, infects dry wood where it produces the sclerotium which may become buried in the soil. The fungus is consumed popularly in Nigeria, especially in the South. Effort is now on to determine whether fruit bodies could be produced on a large scale," the Environmental Biologist disclosed, adding that the Sclerotium serves as food and medicine across African countries. Citing findings of an earlier study on Sclerotium, Dr Stanley said that in Ghana, for instance, the product is used as medicine against mal-nutritional, anaemic and antibacterial illnesses, manage cancer, as well

as part of the ingredients for embalming corpses,

while in Nigeria, it is used to treat heart problems, including asthma, cough, headache, stomach ailments, cold and fever, smallpox and high blood pressure, adding that it is also rich in vitamin, mineral, protein and carbohydrate, but low in fat.

"Following the nutritional and medicinal values of *Sclerotia*, we will be collaborating with the

We must allow our economy to develop in such a way that it would affect every other aspect of the country." He bemoans policies on youth development in the country, saying: "like every other policy in the country, youth developmental policies are not very impressive. In Nigeria, every youth looks forward to a better future, but when there is systemic failure, it becomes difficult for the youths to actualise their potentials in life. We have seen policies and reforms by various governments; I think any government that is serious about development would focus on education, which is the bedrock of development.

Emina urges his younger colleagues to embrace change that would enable them benefit from the graduate programme, disclosing that in the next ten years, he hopes to be in a decision-making body to contribute to a better society, either in the public or private sector.

Iwarimie-Jaja Seeks **Criminal Justice Reform In Nigeria**

Iwarimie-Jaja made the call while delivering the 105th Inaugural Lecture titled, "Criminology: The Criminologist's Eye in Re-occurring Crime Problems in Nigeria", at the Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium last Thursday, warning that until the Nigerian government heeds the advice of Criminologists to restructure the criminal justice system, crime in its various manifestations would continue to be on the rise and threaten national development.

"Reforming the Nigerian criminal justice system is to introduce democracy and good neighbourliness into the Police, the courts and correctional institutions, where communities would assist in policing the society to ensure that crime is reduced and controlled," he explained, listing underfunding, undue partisan interest by judicial officers, abuse of the immunity clause and excessive backlog of cases as challenges militating against efficient crime control and speedy administration of justice in Nigeria.

"Nigeria requires a more professionalised system of criminal justice system that would be corruption-free, with regularly trained manpower that is equitably remunerated for service, efficient in crime control and prevention," the Inaugural Lecturer pointed out, identifying inadequate manpower, corruption, indiscipline, poor funding, lack of sophisticated communication, inadequate detective and investigative gadgets and poor motivation, as impediments to effective crime control and prevention by the Nigerian Police Force.

Iwarimie-Jaja, who noted that crimes in Nigeria has economic, social, political, moral, international, physical

and emotional consequences, listed high level unemployment, poverty, drug use, unstable family system and low educational attainment, as some of the factors responsible for the upsurge in crime wave in Nigeria.

He asserted that "any meaningful government policy on crime reduction must involve education, job creation and corruption management," warning that the crime portfolio would continue to rise until Nigerian policymakers recognize the place Criminologists in the scheme

Describing the Criminologist's eye as a set of perspectives used for deeper understanding of crime, Iwarimie-Jaja, who enumerated various criminological perspectives and theories, recommended the establishment of a Centre for Criminology and Security Studies in the University to provide adequate knowledge and practical skills that would be deployed in tackling crime and security challenges bedevilling the Nigerian State.

In his remarks, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajjenka, who noted that the Lecture, which focused on crime control and prevention, came at a very critical time when the nation was plagued by a plethora of crimes and terrorist activities, bemoaned the high level of corruption

in Nigeria as published by Transparency International in its latest Corruption Perceptions Index (CPI). He stressed the need to rid the country of corruption and check crime to pave the way for accelerated national development.

Ajienka, who spoke through the Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration), Professor Ethelbert Nduka, drew the attention of the audience to the link between intelligence quotients and crime, noted that Nigerians are very intelligent people, stating that "if we channel our awesome intelligence to positive ventures as is the case in other countries, our country would be a great place to live in and do business."

Enforce Senate Graduation to enforce the decision of Senate Benchmark, V-C Directs CGS of the University on publication of a minimum of two Journal articles and

Professor Ajienka, who reinforced the directive at this year's Orientation exercise for fresh and returning graduate students at the Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium, University Park, last Tuesday, tasked the students to carry out relevant research that would tackle nagging societal problems by transforming knowledge into products

The Vice-Chancellor, who was represented by his Deputy in charge of Research and Development, Professor Bene Willie-Abbey, stressed the need for them to publicize their work in reputable Journals to expand the

frontiers of knowledge, charging them to explore ideas that would lead to major breakthroughs in research. He restated Management's resolve to implement a recent policy that makes it mandatory for all genuine students to comply with the timeframe stipulated for payment of statutory and non-statutory charges, while appropriate sanctions would be invoked against defaulters.

In her address, Provost of the College, Professor Roseline Konya, who disclosed that a total of 3,272 graduate students

gained admission in the current session, said the Orientation exercise was meant to acquaint both fresh and returning students with the programmes and activities of the College, stating that this year's exercise was the first after the restructuring of the defunct

School of Graduate Studies into a College with four Graduate Schools.

The four Schools according to Professor Konya, are Graduate Schools of Engineering and Technology; Business, Management and Trade; Arts, Education and Social Sciences and Natural, Applied and Medical Sciences with Professors Adewale Dosunmu, Chinedum Ezirim, Martins Ifeanacho and Gregory Awviri as Deans. She commended the students for abiding by the new procedures for fees payment and registration, appealing to Departments to comply strictly with the academic calendar to avoid cases of students overstaying on programmes.

"Our Scholarship scheme is expected to be competed for very soon to take care of the 2012/2013 session. Last year, some candidates benefitted from the maiden edition of the scheme. The standard of the PhD Seminar presentations has improved tremendously and we owe that to your effort and the Supervisors," the Provost told the students, disclosing further that the College has initiated steps to cross-fertilize ideas with local and international universities to attain global best practices in research and

Panelists Decry Machiavellian Party Politics In Nigeria At CATALYST Confab



s the political party system continues to fumble and wobble in what analysts have described as Nigeria's nascent democracy, a group of students under the aegis of CATALYST organized an intellectual discourse, last Friday, on party politics and governance in Nigeria tagged: The CATALYST Conversation aimed at forging a way out of the woods for the potentially great country.

The event which had Drs Lucky Akaruese and Andrew Efemini, both of the Department of Philosophy, Faculty of Humanities and Williams Wodi, Deputy Registrar (Information) in the Office of the Vice-Chancellor, as Panelists was titled, "The Nigerian Political System and the Crises of Governance: The Connecting Nexus".

The discussants agreed that political parties in Nigeria are generally bereft of identifiable ideologies, clear-cut principles of good governance and internal democracy; factors they agreed have adversely affected the Nigerian political system and scuttled national development in the process.

To Dr Efemini, any commitment to good governance must focus on the silent majority, who he described as poor and vulnerable to the manipulations of power-hungry politicians, arguing that "the colonial masters never intended that we should have genuine democracy; that was why a brutal state ruled by political and economic predators was bequeathed to Nigeria at Independence. The resultant effects are everywhere today in the country's political area".

He stressed that from Independence to the present time, the nature and character of the Nigerian state has not changed as violence remains the choice strategy for capturing state power in advancement of the selfish interests of insensitive politicians.

Dr Efemini called on the youths to "form and join movements that would enable them to network and illuminate the burning national issues of the day as a way of challenging the power base of the political class that wishes to perpetuate itself in power without providing democracy dividends to the people they claim to serve"

On his own part, Dr Akaruese argued that it is the character of those who make up the political parties that determines the nature of governance in the country, blaming the current political crises in the country on the absence of a proper philosophical base on which the parties are established. He asserted that there is hardly any true national political party in Nigeria today-a sad scenario, which he said had adversely affected the way politics is played. He also blamed youths for some of the ills of society. "You are the ones who confer bogus award and give seven gbosas to men without honour for money and also engage in mind-boggling scams on the social media that tarnish the image of the country. You have the inherent capacity to be worse than those you are currently criticizing. The youths must accept some measure of responsibility for what has gone wrong and join forces to reverse the downward slide of our dear country", Akaruese advised them.

Also contributing to the discourse, Wodi identified lack of a properly-institutionalized and ideologically-grounded opposition parties and criminalization of courageous opposition politicians, who do not see things the government's way, as main shortcomings of the Nigerian political space. "The Media are also under severe pressures from government and other powerful interests because they are becoming activists and assuming the space vacated by very weak opposition

parties, some of which are waiting for invitation to join the ruling parties". He condemned the rising culture of mediocrity among politicians, who he accused of desiring the pecks of high office without exhibiting measurable skills on how to deliver quality social services to the masses, calling on the youths to prepare to fill the leadership vacuum created by a barren political class that is focused on the pursuit of its own pecuniary interest.

Earlier in his address, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, represented by Director, Quality Assurance and Quality Control (QAQC) Unit, Professor Tony Arinze, who commended the CATALYST Organization for the bold initiative to open up discussions on the direction of the country, recalled the days when students were engaged in robust intellectual debates on national and international issues as part of their contributions to nation-building.

The CATALYST is an independent, non-partisan, nonprofit, equal opportunity, leadership and entrepreneurial development organization, which provides fora for ventilation of ideas on themes and perspectives of interest to members. The body also focuses on the socio-political and economic events within a national and regional milieu to create enlightenment and instil the discipline of good leadership and responsible citizenship, as well as promote the spirit of interaction and build a culture of patriotism amongst students of Nigerian universities.

INRES Launches Video-Conferencing Lecture Series

n line with policy of the National Universities Commission (NUC) on online teaching and learning to facilitate wider access to education, the Institute of Natural Resources, Environment and Sustainability (INRES), has blazed the trail with the application of Video-conferencing facilities to teach its Master's degree students.

Speaking to UNIPORT Weekly penultimate Thursday, Director of INRES, Professor Enuvie Akpokodje, who said that the Video-conference technique was adopted to expose students of the Institute to global best practices through internationalisation at home, disclosed that the online courses are delivered in collaboration with the University of Gothenburg, Sweden, which is one of the partnering universities, alongside six others in the Niger

Mr Barinaadaa Kobani of the Web Services Unit of ICTC, who provided technical services at the maiden online lecture delivered by Professor Rodney Stevens of Gothenburg, said that the Institute was the first in the University to apply the Google apps for education software provided by search engine giants, Google for educational purposes. Mr Kobani, however, lamented that the current bandwidth was not strong enough to fully support the interactive session, mostly at peak periods, calling on the authorities to tackle the shortcoming to bridge the digital divide.

Responding to questions, Director of ICTC, Professor Anthony Ibe, expressed optimism that the system would be sustainable. "We can sustain it and fortunately, we are at the verge of receiving assistance from the National Universities Commission through the Nigerian Research and Education Network (NgREN) project. The fund will address challenges posed by limited bandwidth and irregular electricity supply in the Centre," the Director assured stakeholders.

he University of Port Harcourt Chapter of an international student organization, AIESEC, has disclosed plans to take the third phase of its Project Pink Campaign on breast, cervical and prostate cancers to selected Communities and Local Government Areas in Rivers State this July.

The campaign which would cover Eleme, Ahoada East, Emohua, Degema Local Government Areas, Amadi Ama and Ogbunabali communities in the Port Harcourt City Council, according to the Project Director, Achese Inimgba, would also reach out to corporate organizations in the target areas to enlist their support in the battle against cancer. "The campaign would involve screening people, who present symptoms and signs of the deadly disease and referring them to appropriate health institutions for possible remedial measures aimed at saving lives", he said.

The Project Director, who observed that the high prevalence of various forms of cancer, motivated AIESEC to take the campaign to rural communities in the State, noted that the project would enable the organization compile a data base that would serve as a statistical reference pool to relevant institutions engaged in the onerous battle to reduce the cancer burden in the affected areas under the pilot project.

"We are working with our Learning Partner, the Rivers State Chapter of the Nigerian Medical Women Association and selected medical personnel from the University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital (UPTH)to realize this important goal", Inimgba disclosed, promising that every effort would be made by AIESEC to reach as many patients as possible during the campaign period. 

Professor Nongxa also disclosed that Wits, which has about 2,000 international students from over 80 countries is focused on quality research aimed at solving social problems.

According to him, the University had 220 highlyrated researches out of which, 16 were in the A category, seven research institutes and 20 research units, adding that there were also 22 prestigious South African Research Chairs, six Centres of Excellence in specialized areas of

further brand the University," Oruene said.

Managing Director of the University of Port Harcourt Academy Paints, Mr Franklin Ogwurumba said, "The main thrust of our research is being able to source materials from the local environment as substitutes to imported materials with the aim of producing something unique for our growing clientele. We are currently working on glue tipol-used for removing grease and on phosphorescent paint. We also want to add the phosphorescent paint on candles as a substitute to poor electricity supply".

Mr Ogwurumba disclosed that the paint factory is into partnership with



the Department of Chemistry in the College of Natural and Applied Sciences to source appropriate materials, stating that presently, the plant has a complete laboratory that trains students. He disclosed that over 20 Industrial Training (IT) students have so far graduated in the art of paint-making from the factory. "We want to get to the market and break even with our product, since most of the aggregates used are locally-sourced", the Managing Director said.

A Lecturer in the Department of History and Diplomatic Studies, Dr Stanley Okoroafor, said the Institute of Niger Delta Studies is working on Elaeis Guineensis (Oil Palm tree), in partnership with different Faculties, Departments and Colleges in the University to perfect the technology for possible commercialization.

"The works being exhibited are wastes from the oil palm which are usually thrown away, but we have converted them to create wealth. With this material, we can make soap, sponge, shoe polish, cake for animals, brooms, baskets, ornaments and the fibre from the palm tree could be used as Plaster of Paris (POP), which is a perfect substitute for ceiling our buildings", Dr Okoroafor explained, stating that a Postgraduate students in his Department is currently researching on it as her project work.

Also speaking, at the exhibition stand, a Lecturer in the Department of Electrical/Electronics Engineering, Rivers State Polytechnic, Mr Anthony Taneh, who exhibited a multipurpose burglar alarm security system that can serve as security device for offices, residential and industrial areas, said the essence of the device is to curb break-ins by intruders into homes and offices.
