

NIAS Holds Maiden Professional Exam In UNIPO

raduates of Animal Science have been enjoined to embrace the newlyintroduced professional examination which is a prerequisite for induction into membership of the Nigerian Institute Animal Science (NIAS) by new entrants into the profession.

Speaking with UNIPORT Weekly on the sideline of the maiden professional examination of the body, last Tuesday, a Lecturer in Animal Science from the Asaba Campus of Delta State University, Abraka, Professor Ikenna Omeje, said that the Graduate Animal Science (GAS) examination would henceforth be conducted annually at different Centres in the country, "Each Centre would host students from different universities within a State. The maiden GAS examination took place at different Centres in the country where Animal Science is studied. Each Centre is supervised by a Registered Animal Scientist from the NIAS headquarters in Abuja", he disclosed.

Professor Omeje observed that to become full members of NIAS, prospective applicants must have five years post-graduation experience as a precondition to become Registered Animal Scientists, "Right now, we admit successful applicants as Graduate Animal Scientists, pending when they would meet all the requirements that would qualify them to be inducted into the Institute as bona fide members

No Instant Success In Creative Writing ~Ajaegbo, MA Student

Ifeanyi Ajaegbo is a rising star in the literary firmament, with an enviable portfolio of local and international awards. This distinguished Master's degree student in the Department of English Studies spoke to our Correspondent, HUMPHREY OGU, on a number of issues relating to creative writing and the reading culture in Nigeria, amongst others.

feanyi Ajaegbo washed his hands early, and has since been dinning with elders on the decorated literary table. In the last one decade or so, Ajaegbo's literary works have either been on the shortlist of national and international literary prizes or emerged as winner.

Ajaegbo, who cut his creative writing teeth with a collection of poems titled: Fire Dance in 1993, won the coveted Commonwealth Short

Stories Prize for the African Region in 2005, with a short story titled: "Dead Man Walking". The story was later published in a highly-acclaimed collection titled: Dead Man Walking and Other Stories. The collection won the prestigious Association of Nigerian Authors-ANA/Lantern Prize for Prose. That's not all. In

2012, his maiden Novel, Sarah House.

published in South Africa, was on the shortlist of one of the most prestigious literary prizes in Africa; the Nigerian Liquefied Natural Gas (NLNG) Prize for Literature, which was won by Chika Unigwe, his friend and former colleague at the University of Nigeria, Nsukka, where he received his undergraduate education. The same novel was also on the Commonwealth Book Prize for 2013.

"I started telling stories from childhood and decided to go for a course that would help me build up my story-telling ability and I was advised to go for Mass Communication," he disclosed, adding that he would have opted for Creative Writing if it were available as a degree programme in a Nigerian University at the time. On whether Creative Writing could be taught

in the classroom, Ajaegbo explained that the subject has two main components-the technical aspect which includes the rules of grammar and so on; while the creative muse-the interaction between the creative writer and his inspiration cannot necessarily be taught.

"That is why we have good and bad writers. Someone can write well in Good

English, grammatically speaking, but may still not be a good creative writer; while another person can write well subi n standard English and still write well,"

citing Samuel Selvon's Lonely Londoners, as a work that enjoys wide readership, despite the unconventional language usage.

Ajaegbo, who is working on "Focalisation and Narration in Ngugi wa Thiong'O's Wizard of the Crow" in his MA programme, said: "I'm trying to show that it is not always easy to distinguish between seeing and speaking. I chose Ngugi because he has been screaming that African Literature should be written in African languages to capture its true African flavour."

The multiple award-winning author, who noted that Nigerian writers are doing well in literature, disclosed that the 2013 shortlist for the Commonwealth Prize had four African authors, out of which, three are Nigerians and the remaining one, a South African; while the 2013 Caine Prize for African Writing parades four Nigerian writers out of the five that made the list. Again, the only Nigerian out of the five Africans on the Caine Prize shortlist last year emerged as the winner.

On the view that Nigerians are no longer reading, Ajaegbo said: "There is an upsurge in readership. The only challenge is that economic hardship has made it difficult for people to have access to good books. In fact, Achebe's There Was a Country is sold on the street and it is being pirated every day.

Respondents Seek Clean, Green Campus Environment

The United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) marked World Environment day on 5th June, 2013, with a call for better environmental stewardship. In this report OTIKOR SAMUEL and WILLIAMS WODI examine some harmful practices that endanger the health of Staff and Students on Campus.



aced with epileptic electricity supply from the Power Holding Company of Nigeria (PHCN), most Nigerians have understandably resorted to alternative sources of power supply, some of which now pose grave health hazards in ways that were never contemplated at the outset. What is obvious today is that nobody contemplates setting up a business outlet or building personal houses without making plans for independent power sources. These days, PHCN is jokingly said to be on standby, while the almighty "I big Pass My Neighbour" has become the main source of power supply across the country, where we are used to talking about light in place of actually supply it to

regrettably comes at a huge cost to both the living environment and health of individuals, who are compelled to inhale dangerous fumes from power generating plants that are indiscriminately installed at business centres and private homes as a necessity. The irony of the situation is that most of those exposed to the poor environmental practices do not even appear to be conscious of the grave health hazards posed through inhalation of dangerous fumes from power generating plants. It is sad that the practice of indiscriminate pollution of the environment is gradually creeping

> unchecked. When the Security Department moved to curb the practice, business operators understandably protested the exercise through negative media campaigns. Reacting to the trend, Professor Martins Ifeanacho of the Department of Sociology in the Faculty of Social

Sciences, who regretted that issues relating to Health, Safety and Environment (HSE) affect all sectors of human endeavour, decried the brazen violation of approved environmental regulations on Campus by business operators, who put profit over people in the line

He cited the crowded business centres as examples of areas that have presently defeated the awareness campaigns mounted by authorities of the University aimed at attaining safety, hygiene and proper environmental stewardship on Campus. Additionally, the operators also spill petroleum products in the environment without considering the implications on the health of staff and students.

"At various business centres in the University, we have a large number of people crowding themselves into very limited spaces with attendant health hazards. Unfortunately, the activities they engage in are usually powered by electricity generating sets that emit dangerous carbon monoxide which is hazardous to human health. But beyond such transactions are the poor hygiene and safety habits of the business centre operators on Campus. The lighting connections are bad and no provision is made to factor emergencies into their operations. Safety is not all about putting measures in place to contain fire outbreaks and other sundry contingencies; it also encompasses consumption of good food, potable drinking water and proper disposal of refuse," Professor Ifeanacho said.

Responding to questions posed by our Correspondent, most of the business centre operators claimed to be aware of HSE rules on Campus, regretting however, that they are compelled to resort to the use of power generating plants to mitigate the epileptic power supply from PHCN as a means of staying business. They, however, claimed to be mindful of the level of hygiene expected of service providers in a university environment, revealing that they prepare food with the same water provided for students by the University. They also claimed to properly dispose refuse generated in cellophanes provided by the Campus Environmental Beautification and Sanitation Unit (CERAS).

"I see students as my own children, so I prepare their food the same way I cook for my family. We use aprons provided to us by the Coca Cola company and ensure that our environment is always kept clean," one of food Vendors said, urging authorities of the University to be more proactive in enforcing extant sanitation rules.

Meanwhile, outgoing Acting Head of the Department of Preventive and Social Medicine (PSM), Dr Charles Tobin-West, has advised relevant Units of the University to ensure that electricity generating plants are not kept in poorly ventilated area due to the emission of carbon monoxide which is poisonous to humans. "Generators should be kept in airy places not in enclosures. Prolonged noise from the electricity generators is also hazardous to human health because it can lead to partial deafness," the expert said, advising government to work towards uninterrupted public power supply as a means of saving

Arokoyu Advises FG On Flood Management

Pollowing the devastating floods that ravaged parts of the country last year and the prediction by the Nigeria Meteorological Agency (NIMET) of even more rains this year, Director of the Centre for Disaster and Risk Management (CDRM), Professor Samuel Arokoyu, has advised the Federal Government to build buffer dams as an effective measure to mitigate the effects of the impending flood disaster.

Arokoyu, who gave the advice in an interview with a UNIPORT Weekly Correspondent, penultimate Friday, said that this was necessary to re-direct the heavy water that would be released either from the Ladgo Dam in Cameroon or the excess flow of the River Niger. Observing that reports also from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) indicated that the severity and frequency of weather related disasters would be high due to extreme weather conditions, he advised "states and local governments to

The University of Port Harcourt Student affiliate of the Nigerian Environmental Society (NES), joined the rest of the world to mark the 2013 World Environment Day at the International Students' Centre, last Thursday.

Delivering a paper on the 2013 theme of World Environment Day: "Think. Eat. Save", Professor Matthew Wegwu of the Department of Biochemistry, warned against external and internal wastage of food, explaining that external food waste refers to excess food remains after meal, while internal food waste is excess food consumed, despite the fact that the individual may not really be hungry. He warned that internal food waste does the body more harm than good, advising people to consume only the food their body needs.

Stressing the importance of balanced diet to the body, Professor Wegwu noted that "Studies indicate reduced cancer risk among persons who regularly consume fruits and vegetables; especially, cancer of the gastrointestinal tract, breast, lung and bladder. Reports indicate that some phytochemicals present in the fruits and vegetables block the cancer process.

"The nutritional and health benefits of food must be balanced against any food-related hazards," the Biochemist observed. "Restraints in our polluting activities is advised and clearly defined guidelines emanating from integrated research, management and policy-making are important criteria for effective protection of the aquatic environment and agricultural lands, including use of modern, highly-efficient harvesting, food processing, preservation and storage techniques and development of environment friendly, adopt proactive measures by providing critical infrastructure needed to mitigate the effects on the people".

The Director said that the Centre has been working with the National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) to create awareness on the effects of floods and how to avoid them, stressing that it has participated in national workshops in which papers were presented by the Director. "Last Year, the Centre collaborated with NEMA and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) to carry out a post disaster needs assessment in which I coordinated the South-South region", he stated. According to him, "it is not proper to just fold our arms and expect that the floods will take care of itself. We are expecting much rain this year and we should ask ourselves, how do we take care of the situation?"

Professor Arokoyu regretted that most of the states in

Nigeria do not have State Emergency Management Agencies, although some have Ministries of Environment that coordinate the issue of floods and other environmental concerns, adding that the stakeholder's workshop is encouraging states to be proactive in the prevention of disasters, especially those associated with floods. "When you cannot prevent the disaster, you prepare for it. Disaster is very easy to manage. A simple form is to take people away from disaster. What you simply do is to manage the relationship between the disaster and the people", he

On the process of constructing buffer dams, the Director said that "had the government commenced the construction of the dams since the last flood incident, by now the project would have reached an advanced stage", pointing out that "if we cannot handle the large scale dam, we can make little ones to direct water in order to reduce the effects on the citizenry". He also said that the redirection of water will also boost fishing activities in areas where the water would be channelled to

Professor Arokoyu acknowledged the fact that taking people away from disaster prone areas is a complex issue as people are emotionally attached to areas where they have lived for a long time, also stated that the cost of resettlement is high. He said that it would be costeffective to channel resources for resettlement of the vulnerable people into building dams.

The Professor of Geography stressed that disasters are becoming more frequent and severe, causing more damages on the environment. "Most of these disasters are caused by extreme weather events. Most common is flood, drought and storm". Professor Arokoyu quoting a renowned researcher, Crea, in his study said that almost 90% of all disasters; 99% of victims of disasters, and 80% of victims of death were weather related, advising that what individuals can do in the face of disaster is to prepare for it.


Director of the Institute, Professor Godwin Igwe, who made the disclosure in a release signed by the Registrar, Mrs Matilda Nnodim and made available to UNIPORT Weekly, said the Full-Time programme with 12 calendar months duration is flexible to accommodate industry workers through the modular and sandwich programme arrangement.

Professor Igwe further disclosed that the "programme is to provide graduates with broad-based training required for refining and processing of crude oil, produce competent and industry-ready Refining and Petrochemical Processing graduates that will be fully prepared to work in the oil and gas industry at local and international levels," adding that the programme which would be executed in various modules would feature Lecturers within and outside Nigerian universities and experts from the industry.

On prospects of the programme, the Director said that graduate students would be trained on energy types and role of fossil fuels in global energy mix, hydrocarbon chemistry and sequence of crude oil processing operations, including crude oil distillation, refinery equipment and flow sheet, as well as economic and

contractual aspects of the natural gas sector, amongst other related areas.

The Acting Director disclosed that the Press was able to produce a prototype four-in-one UNIPORT Subject Note Book and hopes to do more with the right machines in place. "One of the fundamental things that we need to do is to get the University Press to generate a consistent character for all printed materials for the University

with a view to generate revenue". Dr Inyang said, emphasizing that there are also a number of other things that the Press can do other than just printing examination booklets and Inaugural Lecture text.

"The press is currently into partnership with the Niger Delta University (NDU) Publishing Company and intends to partner Akwa Ibom State University on its General Studies material series", Dr Inyang revealed, adding that the facility still requires more equipment

> for proper service delivery and expressed hope to enter into more partnerships with other Institutions.

"The success story so far recorded by the Press under my leadership has renewed our clients' confidence in our ability to deliver high quality services promptly; some of our clients, including the UNIPORT Staff Cooperative Limited and the Micro-Finance Bank Choba are now willing to do business with the University Press. We hope to sustain the trend as part of our initiative to reposition the facility," he explained.

The Press, according to Dr Inyang, now handles printing jobs for the College of Continuing Education, (CCE) and the University Demonstration Secondary and Primary Schools respectively.

UNIPORT Researcher Overcomes Poor Melon Yield

Respite has finally come to local farmers experiencing difficulty with Primextra Gold in the process of melon production. Primextra Gold is a commonly-used herbicide that is affordable and readily available to farmers in the market.

A Lecturer in the Department of Crop and Soil Science, Faculty of Agriculture, Dr Udensi Udensi in an experiment on the tolerance level of melon to the herbicide, randomly used by local farmers, who intercrop melon with maize, cassava and yam, disclosed that the herbicide adversely affects melon production because of wrong timing in terms of application and dosage. "From the findings, we discovered that wrong usage of the herbicide which contains two active ingredients, Atrazine and Metolachlor, adversely affects melon production and yield. Poor yield of melon and complaint by local farmers prompted this research". "Melon can tolerate 0.25kg up to 0.35kg in the soil and if

the herbicide is applied, then melon can be planted between 10 to 12 days at a higher dose of about 1.5kg per hectare. This period is also the best time to plant maize because there would be decimal weed control for the maize and melon. There would be no injury to the melon, while weeds would be reduced amongst the growing corn", he added.

Dr Udensi, who noted that the use of the herbicide does not affect intercropping, said that the research findings show that Primextra Gold could be sprayed on maize without adversely affecting harvest. "Local farmers complain of this particular herbicide because they do not know the exact time to plant melon and the dosage to apply in the process. So the problem of poor melon yield has been corrected with this research", he noted.
