

# **Stakeholders Chart Pathways** To Development Of N'De

olicy failures and nonimplementation of research findings on the Niger Delta region have been attributed to corruption, lack of commitment and dishonesty in governance, while demand and advocacy for good leadership by civil society and the intelligentsia have not been well co-ordinated to exert the necessary pressures on the system to drive development.

These were some of the views canvassed by scholars and concerned citizens, who converged

at a Workshop on the Niger Delta organized by the Nigeria Sustainable Development Solutions Network (NSDSN), at the Institute of Petroleum Studies (IPS) penultimate Thursday.

Participants also observed that intervention strategies employed in the implementation of research findings and policies in such areas as gas flaring, youth restiveness, gender inequality, unemployment, poverty, HIV/AIDS and other diseases, oil bunkering, voters' right and obligations, education, public awareness and perception of Niger Delta issues, have not

received the necessary attention from policy-makers, while value systems that once guided society have collapsed due to corruption and mediocre leadership, especially in recent times.

Participants identified challenges of sustainable development in the Region in the restoration of the fragile ecosystem aimed at tackling such issues as climate change, socioeconomic livelihood, as well as capacity building on community governance, evaluation of previous intervention strategies in the Niger Delta and ways of promoting best

Dr Ihejirika was the only Nigerian on the SIGNIS Panel of Jury that evaluated films entered for the Festival.

Speaking to UNIPORT Weekly last Monday on arrival from the festival in Tanzania, the Acting Head of Department disclosed that the fiesta provided him an opportunity to interact with both African and international filmmakers and appreciate the largest cultural art festival in the East and Central Africa.

Dr Ihejirika, who further revealed that an Anglo-Kenyan film producer, Nick Reding, won the SIGNIS category, while an Iranian film producer emerged overall winner at the Festival, advised Nigerian film producers to identify with international film festivals by

subjecting their works to professional evaluation.

We should not only celebrate ourselves in the country, we should also celebrate our works at the international level.

Nigerian film producers should begin to enter into peer review and identify with international film

festivals for evaluation," the Acting HOD said, disclosing that content, storyline and technicalities were some of the criteria used in evaluating films at the fiesta.





### Olanrenwaju Tackles Hazards **Associated With Solid Mineral Exploration**

Ways of exploring solid mineral resources without compromising the health of individuals and safety of the environment is the main concern of Abiodun Olanrewaju, a Doctoral candidate in the Department of Physics, Faculty of Physical Sciences, College of Natural and Applied Sciences. He shares his experience and research interest with our Correspondents, HUMPHREY OGU and MERCYADENIJI

t is generally believed that diversification of Nigeria's economy, through exploration and exploitation of solid mineral resources would positively change the economic fortunes of the country. It would result in more foreign exchange earnings and creation of employment opportunities for the teeming army of unemployed youths. However, turning to solid mineral resources has its own health hazards.

Olanrewaju, who obtained the Master of Science degree in the Department of Physics is back to complete his doctoral research in the same field.

Working on a dissertation titled: "Assessment and Anthropogenic Radionuclide in Solid Minerals and soil of Mining Areas of Benue State", Olanrewanju said Nigeria is currently looking at mineral resources as an alternative to petroleum, stating that his research is aimed at tackling health challenges associated with

"We are looking at radionuclide which is everywhere: it is in the air we breathe and the land we build on. We are interested in such human activities that could spread this radionuclide to find out if it has been embedded in our terrestrial land and rocks. In the course of mining activities, we tend to expose them, thus endangering their health. So we are looking at the effects of such exposure on the environment, and how it has been activated as a result of this anthropogenic effect," he

> Olanrewaju, who noted that the Federal Ministry of Mineral Resources has more interest in explor

ing minerals in Nigeria, said: "If we look at the production aspect of these minerals, we discover that most people, especially the explorers are not paying attention to the effects of the techniques they use on the environment and human health. We are interested in the side effects of these exploration activities."

Citing China as a country that has been able to make so much economic progress without relying on petroleum, Olanrewaju pointed out that Nigeria's oil production is dwindling, necessitating shift of focus to solid mineral resources that abound in some parts of the country.

The Doctoral candidate, who uses the Library regularly, expressed satisfaction with the available collection of books in his field. Disclosing that he faced a lot of challenges in the course of his research, Olanrewanju noted that nothing comes easy as challenges are part of success in life.

Professor Bell-Gam gave the advice penultimate Wednesday, when students of the School visited the University on an excursion, as part of a Community Service initiative organised by a Corp Member, Mr Michael Obekpa, who is currently doing his primary assignment in the School.

The Dean stated that the familiarization visit should afford the students an opportunity to choose appropriate careers on the completion of their studies. "When you come into the University, normally you choose a career or discipline that would influence the rest of your life. The Entrepreneurial Centre of the University, for instance, creates an opportunity for you to be creative, acquire skills that would be of help to you and others around. You can learn how to sew, weave, carve, draw and even weld." he said, adding that "apart from the discipline acquired, the Entrepreneurial Centre also affords you an

opportunity to be self-employed and be an employer of labour, rather than a job seeker on graduation from the University."

Professor Bell-Gam lauded the students for the visit, assuring them that the doors of the University would always be open to them, should they choose to study here on the completion of their secondary education.

Acting Director of the Entrepreneurial Centre, Dr Prince Nwakanma, who received the students on behalf of the University, said the Centre is set up to equip students with functional skills that would enable them become employers of labour on graduation. "The future of Africa and Nigeria in particular lies in the hand of young entrepreneurs. We want to reduce unemployment through mentoring and advisory services that are available in this Centre. Entrepreneurs lead the economy of the country. We also identify successful alumni and link our students to learn from them", he

was necessitated by the United Nations (UN) Decade of Action on Road Safety 2011-2020, aimed at mobilizing stakeholders to commit to the reduction of road fatality by 50 per cent by the

The Director also pointed out that the partnership arrangement between the FRSC and state governments on reduction of carnages across the country motivated the setting up of a Committee saddled with the responsibility of accessing the level of preparedness of each state towards achieving the goals of the UN Decade of Action and the Accra Declaration of reducing road traffic

crash fatality by 50 per cent in 2015. "This is in addition to the National Economic Blue Print of Vision 20:2020 which was conceived to make Nigerian roads rank in the league of 20 global safest roads by 2020", he added.

Briefing UNIPORT Weekly after his inauguration last Monday, Professor Akpoghomeh noted that the Committee comprises of State Chairmen of the Nigerian Bar Association, Nigerian Medical Association, the Nigeria Union of Journalists, the National Union of Road Transport Workers, representatives of the Sector Commander of FRSC and the State Government. **Expert Urges Govt** To Tackle Naira Fall

By Obinna Nwodim ollowing the continued slide in the value of the Naira, a monetary expert in the Department of Economics, Faculty of Social Sciences, Dr Hycienth Ajie, has advised the Federal Government to take urgent economic measures to check the trend; warning of a lull in business activities which could result in unemployment, poverty and other social ills if the trend was allowed to persist.

Dr Ajie, who made the assertion in an interview with UNIPORT Weekly in his office, stated that government can save the Naira through application of several economic measures, as well as rebuilding the local economy. According to him, the Federal Government should intervene by supplying more dollars to the market or take other measures necessary that would stabilize the value of the Naira.

"The Government can ensure that the rate at which the dollar exchanges for the Naira is controlled, instead of allowing market forces to determine it" he stated, adding that if Government is capable of fixing the rate of the Naira against the dollar, it should do so to stabilize its value. He stressed the importance of ensuring that the productive capacity of h economy improved upon in

order to

On how the trend affects the local economy, Dr Ajie said that producers would not produce more because of the high cost of production materials. This, he

which would also affect sales, adding that the overall economy, will be affected by the adverse development. The expert added that the decline in the value of the Naira would

said, would in turn result in high cost of goods and services,

increase the price of imported goods, stressing that since the economy is largely dependent on massive imports, the continued downward slide of the Naira would have adverse effect on the economy of Nigeria.

operational practices in the oil and gas industry to benefit majority of Nigerians.

In his welcome address, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, charged the organization to mobilize the academia, business, civil society, and other development organizations to promote problem-solving approaches that would proffer practical solutions to the challenges of sustainable development, expressing hope that Nigerian universities would occupy strategic positions in sustainable development of the nation as is the

case in other countries".

The Vice-Chancellor, who was represented by Deputy Vice-Chancellor, (Research and Development), Professor Bene Willie Abbey, stated that "the University being a major source of knowledge and innovation, needs to drive sustainable development, because they have the capacity to address the developmental challenges facing the country for the benefit of her citizens", he said.

Also speaking, Director of the Network, Professor Ikenna Onyido, said that the Workshop was aimed at reviewing and contextualizing the Niger Delta problem, with a view to properly defining pathways to its development, adding that it was the first in the series of steps by the NSDSN to chart a development roadmap for the Region. Professor Onyido told the gathering that his organization was working in concert with various stakeholders in driving socially inclusive and environmentally sustainable development of the Niger Delta through adoption of a holistic approach with definitive

deliverables.

In a Keynote Address, National Universities Commission (NUC) Scholar in Diaspora, Professor Chidi Ibe, stressed the need for a coherent Action Plan that is driven by a consortium of universities to be led by the University of Port Harcourt through its Institute for Natural Resources, Environment and Sustainable Development (INRES). Professor Ibe, whose address was titled: "From Hocus Pocus to Divination: A Search for an Enduring Development Paradigm for the Niger Delta", stated that readily available data would form sufficient basis for assessing the developmental needs of the area, with a view to reducing the time necessary for a functional Action Plan that would integrate the big picture. Earlier at a courtesy call, Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, who was represented by Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Administration), Professor Ethelbert Nduka, noted that the NSDSN consists of eminent scholars, who have distinguished themselves in their various fields of specialization, expressing willingness of authorities of the University to assist the organization achieve its objectives.

## Artsville: So Far, So Good

On assumption of office as Vice-Chancellor in July 2010, Professor Joseph Ajienka promised to establish an Arts Village, aimed at promoting arts and culture. Our Correspondent, HUMPHREY OGU, examines the journey so far...

Chrere would be a calendar of arts and culture events—Concerts & Conferences, Exhibitions, Festivals & Fairs, Museums & Monuments—to promote educational tourism. Performing companies will be established. We shall encourage creativity and grow a pool of talented creative artistes, writers and practitioners. We shall have Writers-in-Residence, Poets-in-Residence and Artists-in-Residence. There would be Professional Art Schools to train local talents," Professor Joseph Ajienka pledged during his inaugural address.

The Institute, Professor Ajienka said, would also run short courses and offer courses leading to award of Master of Fine Arts (MFA) Degree in Theatre Arts, Visual Arts, Music, Film and Media Studies and

Creative Writing to produce experts in the various disciplines. That the University of Port Harcourt is a breeding ground for highflying actors, actresses, producers, comedians and many entertainment industry players is no longer news—UNIPORT-trained actors, actresses, producers, directors, comedians, artistes, presenters, among others are there for all to see both in and outside the country.

What still makes news in some quarters is that the University has again, blazed a trail with the production of an educational movie titled, "Who Is Afraid of Job Interview?" geared towards preparing Nigerian graduates for the job market. What's more, this film was completely made in UNIPORT in line with established tradition of excellence in the Arts. The screenplay was written by the Director, Institute of Arts and Culture, Professor Julie Okoh, produced and directed by an

alumnus, Lancelot Imasuen, staring alumni and staff, such as Ovunda Ihunwo, amongst other current and former students. With this success story, part of the dream of the Ajienka-led administration for the Arts Village has come true in a grand style.

Dramatic performances and musical concerts have become regular features on Campus as it is the case in other distinguished Universities in Europe, America and elsewhere. And now, the Institute has moved from stage to screen to expand its audience. So, art is being practised fully as envisaged by the Vice-Chancellor from assumption of office in July, 2010.
