Tackling Challenges In Hydrocarbon Industry

The University of Port Harcourt is increasingly partnering the Industry in tackling emergent challenges in the oil and gas sector, writes HUMPHREYOGU

he University of Port Harcourt has carved a niche for itself in the past decade or so as a model institution committed to academic excellence and solving some of the problems facing the critical oil and gas sector. In 2003, for instance, the University in collaboration with TOTAL and the world famous IFP School in Paris blazed the trail with the establishment of the famous Institute of Petroleum Studies (IPS) with the sole objective of training industry-ready hands through a well-thought-out programme of internationalizing higher education at home.


Ten years down the line, the Institute has trained hundreds of young Nigerians, who have been certified as globally-rated Petroleum Engineers. These exceptionally skilled young men and women are conferred with the prestigious Master of Science Degrees in Petroleum Engineering and Project Development jointly awarded by UniPort and the IFP School, Paris, France on the successful completion of the demanding programme.

IPS is a graduate level institution, which has come of age in its ten years of uninterrupted operation. For instance, it has now added the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Petroleum Engineering and Project Development. This is in addition to other emergent Centres under the ever expanding umbrella of the

Institute devoted to training manpower in various aspects of the petroleum industry. The Centre for Gas, Refining and Petrochemicals (CGRP) is one of the units under the Institute.

Just last August, stakeholders in the oil and gas sector converged at the Hotel Presidential, Port Harcourt to proffer solutions to the perennial problems of the sector, despite the availability of huge gas reserves in the Niger Delta region of the country. The event, which drew participants from the industry, academia and government parastatals, including representatives of the Honourable Ministers of Petroleum Resources and Science and Technology, was organised by CGRP in collaboration with Indorama Eleme

Petrochemicals Limited (IEPL) with the appropriate theme: "Creating Wealth through Diversification, Transformation, and Development of our Refineries and Petrochemical Industries."



There was a palpable sense of eager anticipation in the expansive auditorium, as participants and other stakeholders showered praises on the Centre for organising the talk shop in a critical sector of the nation's economy.

Again, stakeholders in the sector reconvened at the same venue last Month. This time, it was a well-patronized Roundtable on Petroleum Exploration, Development and Production, organized by the O. B. Lulu-Briggs Professorial Chair of Petroleum Geosciences in the University of Port Harcourt. Like the earlier conference under the auspices of the CGRP, the Roundtable also drew participants from the crème de la crème of the petroleum industry and the academia.

The University is also concerned with the safety of workers in the oil and gas industry. To this end, the Centre for Occupational Health, Safety and Environment (COHSE), under IPS is committed to training manpower for the sector. The Emerald Energy Institute (EEI), Centre for Petroleum Geosciences (CPG), Offshore Technology Institute (OTI) and Institute of Engineering Technology Innovation and Management (METI) are emergent centres of excellence under the "big, strong and reliable" template of the famous IPS that opened its doors to 20 pioneer students exactly 10 years ago. It is expected that with the massive expansion work currently going on at the main complex of IPS and the newly-completed Emerald Energy Institute, stakeholders are in to witness the rise and rise of the famous Institute which clocks 10 memorable years next month.

These efforts are in addition to the conventional programmes offered in the Departments of Petroleum, Gas and Chemical Engineering. They are clear examples of University-Industry partnership that is not only commendable, but worthy of being replicated in other tertiary institutions. Long live IPS at 10!



Danish Institute Grants UniPort Hydraulic, **Hydrologic Software Licences**



Institut e during his postgraduate studies, explaining that "Mike 11 software can simulate the hydraulic, as well as the morphology of the river system in real time. And we are trying to use it to model the features and power of the major rivers in Rivers State, over a 30-35-year period."

Disclosing that the Mike Urban is currently being used to tackle urban flooding problems in Uvo, Akwa Ibom State, Ezekwe urged students, who want to do similar research in Port Harcourt or elsewhere to avail themselves of the opportunity to use the software, which he said: "cannot be used on a commercial research, because it was categorised as a student licence.

"Apart from helping the students to do what other students and professionals are doing overseas, the software would also afford them

make them more marketable when they graduate from the University of Port Harcourt," he said, adding that the software would also be available and useful to students in the Departments of Civil and Environmental

> and other environmental sciences that have to do with hydraulic. hydrology, storm water management, including watershed management.

"What we are trying to do is to see how we can expose our students to the best training available in their chosen fields. But you can't do that

without exposing them to modern software. Research on flood has gone beyond storytelling. Mike Urban software has the capacity to simulate a real-life flood situation. What we do now is to use digital elevation model of the area. We have to find out the capacity of the drainage, in the laboratory, following which we can decide which way to channel the water, because we understand the causes and flood flashpoints," he

The Hydrology and Water Resources expert, who noted that acquiring the software would have cost the University a lot of money, said: "but DHI has graciously granted us these licences for one year. At expiration of one year,

we would try to see if we could have an extension. but if we don't get an extension, it then means that the University would have to pay a lot of money to get the licences."

In view of the high cost of the software, Ezekwe stressed the need for the University to go into partnership with DHI and become their anchor point in Africa. "If the University partners DHI, UniPort will become a training ground and we may also help market the software. That way, our staff and students would benefit not just from the present software, but also from others available at the Institute. The University would also make money and name from the partnership, while representing the DHI and training other people for the company," he said. The Hydrologist, who noted that such collaboration is in line with the University's entrepreneurial vision, and Industry-Academia initiatives, said: "It will be proper for the

staff would benefit. It would not only generate funds, but could also help the image of the University. Imagine a situation in which everybody from educational institutions and consultancy companies in the whole of Africa have to come to UniPort to train on how to use the important software.



"The programme is open to applicants, who

possess a good Bachelor's Degree in Economics, Political Science, Finance, Foreign Languages, Accounting, History, Marketing, Management or related fields or have earned a Law degree from recognized institutions. Customs and Immigration Officers or other professionals in Trade and related industry with, at least, five years working experience with degree other than the ones mentioned above are eligible to apply", the letter read in part, adding that the programme is for a minimum period of 18 months.

"Participants would pursue a programme rich in practical, technical and theoretical content.

The programme has flexible schedules and modules for working students. This approach would help to minimize the impact on students' work schedules", the letters stated. Interested Applicants are advised to log on to www.uniport.edu.ng and follow the instructions. 

counting; can Nigeria's educational sector be measured with a perf

ormance index that could rate it as good, better or best or are we still battling with a system that is less than average and incomparable to what is obtainable in other developed nations of the world. Ours is a system riddled with uncountable problems that appear to defy conventional solution, ranging from lack of infrastructure at the primary and secondary levels across the country, to poorlyequipped laboratories, libraries and classrooms in universities and other institutions of higher learning. It is also a system that is battling with teachers that lack enthusiasm for what they are paid to do, who most times produce what is now known as unemployable graduates.

Nigeria's educational sector at 53 could be likened to a suckling infant that is very much dependent on its mother for survival. Rather than being

considered as a full-grown adult at 53 with resounding achievements, we have an educational sector that is struggling to survive with the unresolved strike action embarked upon by the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU) and the apparent lack of will to resolve it by the Federal Government as the most recent manifestation of such challenge. This follows the failure of Government to fully implement the 2009 Agreement, which is binding on both parties and is backed with a Memorandum of Understanding. Very recently too, the Senior Staff

Association of Nigerian Universities (SSANU) followed suit following unpaid salaries for the months of August and September. For non-teaching staff, who carried out their legitimate work in anticipation of a just wage. After all, a labourer is worth his wage as the holy Book says.

Examination malpractice have become the order of the day especially for public examinations such as the West Africa School Certificate Examination (WAEC), National Examination Council (NECO) and the Joint Admissions Matriculation Examination (JAMB) with the latest innovation

being a jail term for culprits, who are supposed to be children less than 18 years of age. Even the Almighty Post-Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (Post-UTME) is not corruption- free. The corruption that has eaten so deep into the fabric of our dear country did not spare the educational sector. It is no longer a secret that some universities are money merchants that sell degrees to the highest bidders. Lecturers and teachers are not spared as some are more than ready to sell grades to interested buyers.

As we celebrate the Nation at 53, let it provide an avenue for stock-taking. Let it also provide a time for stakeholders to do a critical review of the sector that is most crucial to the over all development of the country, especially as the country desires to be enlisted among the top 20 industrialized nations of the world by the year 20:20. Happy Independence Anniversary all the same!

Mr Otunla, who was represented by the Director, Treasury, Rivers State, Mr Dagogo Abere, stated that "the principle of accountability entails that people entrusted with the collective wealth of others will be called upon to give account of what they have done with the common wealth, in order to ascertain whether they have achieved the collective objective of the people they serve, especially in a democracy".

Need For Regular Curriculum Review

Rollowing the raging debate over the quality of education in Nigerian today, policymakers and other stakeholders in the education sector have stressed the need for regular curriculum review to enable the sector attain global benchmark that everybody desires.

Experts in the sector gave the charge, while exchanging views with *UniPort Weekly*, penultimate Wednesday, advocating that the curriculum of schools be reviewed, at least, every five years to integrate new thinking and accommodate emerging global trends.

On her part, a Lecturer and specialist in Curriculum Studies, Professor Grace Offorma, noted that since Nigeria is part of the globalization train, there is need for the country to work hard, so that it is not left behind in the emergent knowledge economy that requires specialized skills. Professor Offorma lamented that so many things are wrong with Nigeria's current school curriculum, explaining that most curricula that are being implemented are obsolete and need to be reviewed.

"When we talk about curriculum, it is not just about developing the curriculum; rather we should look at total delivery of knowledge and skills and it is well-equipped teachers, who render such services. You do not just develop the curriculum without adequately training teachers to deliver knowledge to students", she said, adding that teachers need to be fully integrated into changing learning environment to make them understand the concept, method, approaches and techniques of the teaching profession.

Professor Offorma, who is an Ex-offico member of the Curriculum Organisation of Nigeria (CON) and a Lecturer at the University of Nigeria Nsukka, disclosed that when teachers are properly integrated into the scheme of things, "we are creating awareness and people will now know what to do at each turn, because globally, people are worried about changes, which also includes climate change".

The Curriculum Specialist appealed to Government at all levels to support curriculum development and implementation in Nigeria, regretting that "the problem facing the educational sector today is that we have lofty ideas and policies, but Government is not supporting proper implementation and such lofty blueprints. She also called on teachers to be professional and avoid unethical practices that put shame on the teaching profession, stressing that teachers are meant to be hardworking, honest, dedicated and committed to their duties.

In his contribution, Vice-President of CON, Professor Sunday Agwu, corroborated the view that the school curriculum needs to be periodically reviewed, while teachers need to be regularly trained on emerging global trends to be able to fit into the 21" century classroom.

"Curriculum is a dynamic thing; so it must be constantly revisited to make it relevant to an ever changing learning environment. As society evolves, we should be in a position to address emergent issues. Government should be able to accommodate issues arising from curriculum change, as new equipment and methodologies need to be put in place for effective results", he said.

NUC LEADS Scholar Advises FG On Higher Education

ational Universities Commission (NUC), Linkage with Experts and Academics in the Diaspora Scheme (LEADS) Scholar to the University of Port Harcourt, Dr Emma Nwokolo, has advised the Federal Government to do more in order to save the educational system from total collapse.

Dr Nwokolo, who gave the advice in an interview with *UniPort Weekly*, last Wednesday, said that it was imperative for Government at all levels to take a hard look at what ASUU is agitating for with a view to addressing the problems bedevilling the educational sector once and for all.

"The Federal Government can do a lot more than what it claims to have already done in the critical educational sector. It should be able to provide reasonable funding to upgrade the nation's 129 universities that neither attracts foreign students nor scholars at the moment. We cannot afford to run universities that are no better than secondary schools in this age of globalization," he said, warning that the ugly trend portends grave danger signals to the country's quest to become one of the 20 largest economies by the year 2020.

In his opinion, the protracted agitation by the Academic Staff Union of Universities for an enabling environment for teachers and students is in order, bemoaning the decline in the quality of education in Nigeria over the years.

"We need to understand what ASUU is struggling for and support it to reposition the comatose educational system if we hope to make accelerated progress in this country. I graduated from the University of Ibadan in 1972. Looking back between what we had then and now, there is no basis for comparison," he lamented

University, the former Chief of Staff, District of Colombia in the United States commended UniPort for striving towards academic excellence and community service. "The University ranks quite high compared to many other universities in Nigeria. I am quite impressed with the programmes and courses being developed here. Dr Nwokolo said that he was seconded to the University of Port Harcourt Business School to help develop programmes in Healthcare Management. "I teach Healthcare Management at both the Diploma and Master of Business Administration levels. Given my experience in the field, I also teach Human Resources and Strategic Management, Corporate Strategies, Leadership and Ethics," he disclosed.

He commended the wonderful efforts being made by the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Ajienka, and members of his Management team, particularly the Deputy Vice-Chancellor, (Research and Development), Professor Bene Willie Abbey for ensuring that he settled down to do what he was sent to do in the University, and also acknowledging that he had exciting experience with both staff and students of the University during his tour of duty.
