s the country makes frantic efforts towards joining the league of 20 most industrialized economies by 2020, policy-makers have been advised to adopt proactive measures towards the development of Science,

Technology and Innovation if Nigeria stands any chance of achieving the stated goal.

Director-General/Chief Executive Officer, National Office for Technology Acquisition and Promotion (NOTAP), Dr. Umar Bindir, gave the advice while speaking as Guest Lecturer at the

opening ceremony of the 1st Annual University of Port Harcourt Research Fair, last Wednesday at Ebitimi Banigo Auditorium.

Dr. Bindir, whose Lecture was titled: "Research and Development for Sustainable National Development", said that for Nigeria

Senate Approves Degree Award







s the School of Graduate Studies prepares to present 98 Doctoral candidates this Saturday at the 28th Convocation, an improvement on the last ceremony, which had 79 graduates, the policy regulating Graduate Students from overstaying on programmes seems to be paying off. This was the view expressed by Dean of the School, Professor Roseline Konya, while chatting with this Correspondent in her office penultimate Thursday.

Professor Konya, who attributed the innovation in the School to her resolve to consolidate on the success story of her predecessors, disclosed that there is also an improvement in prompt payment of fees by graduate students, unlike what obtained in the past, when most students shelved payment of fees until completion of their programmes, while some did not bother to pay up at all.

A release obtained by UNIPORT Weekly, shows that the 98 Doctoral candidates cut across the seven Faculties, with Science producing the highest number of 33 Graduates. The Faculties of Education produced 22, Social Sciences 16, while Management Sciences produced 12, Humanities 10 and Engineering 4, while one candidate is to graduate from the Basic Medical Sciences.

Similarly, a total of 496 Graduands would also be

awarded Master's Degrees in diverse disciplines. A breakdown of the figure shows that the Faculty of Science has the highest number with 145 graduate students. Faculty of Education has a total of 119, Social Sciences 84, Management Sciences 71, Humanities 47, Basic Medical Sciences 17 and Engineering 13.

Also, 1093 students would be awarded the Postgraduate Diploma in various disciplines in the School. Faculty of Management Sciences has a total of 393, Education 361, Social Sciences 205, Science 82, Engineering 26, Basic Medical Sciences 20, while Humanities produced 11 Graduates.

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


he Department of Educational Psychology, Guidance and Counselling, which recorded the highest number of First Class at the 27 Convocation, has done it again. Come Saturday, the Department, which also produced the Best Graduating Student (BGS) at the last Convocation, though conceding the BGS crown to Faculty of Social Science this year, will be parading four First Class Graduands.

Speaking with UNIPORT Weekly, Acting Head of Department, Dr Peter Kpolovie, who said that they ensured that students in the Department learn better than their counterparts elsewhere, disclosed that there would have been more First Class if not for the two-month strike action embarked upon by the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU), which made processing of results impossible within the stipulated time-line by Senate of the University.

Kpolovie, observed that some Departments may be unable to compute the results of up to 10 per cent of those who are supposed to graduate in the U/2007 set, adding that "it is with great pleasure that we produced four First Class Graduands this year. First Class is not like water that you just fetch and drink. It is only meant for exceptional students, not only for those who are gifted exceptionally, but those who also put in the requisite effort to make such grade from day one in the University." Distinction, he added, is for those who have worked dedicatedly, pursuing only academic issues and leaving out the uncountable sideattractions that tend to make students forget that they are in school for serious business, stating that, "to make such a grade, a student must be made to

believe that the Lecturers are also serious."



Kpolovie, who stated that males and females are equally gifted, explained that "there is nothing like gender disparity in measuring intelligence quotient. Nature is even, it's never biased. It has bequeathed blessing evenly. Males and females are equally intelligent and can perform at the same level of intellectual intensity."

He regretted that the Nigerian educational system has not incorporated intelligent testing, which he said, determines suitability of candidates for various programme up till now. According to him, people are admitted into Nigerian universities without the university knowing their levels of intelligence. Disclosing that he has developed and standardized a test known as Culture Fair Intelligence Test for use in Nigeria since 2002, Dr Kpolovie bemoaned the unwillingness of policy-makers to adopt results of research findings, which are published in Journals allowed to rot away in bookshelves.

"Any person who needs to know his or her intelligence quotient accurately and reliably can come and take the test," he said,

revealing that results from that test have shown that there is no significant difference between males and females in respect to intelligence."

"That hundred persons are equally intelligent does not mean that they will make the same grade in the University, because excellence in academics has two factors. You have ability, what the person can do; then, the other one is effort. Academic

success and success in life are functions of ability and effort. Ability plus efforts equals success", Kpolovie said.

"Where an individual has the ability but fails to put in the required effort, ability will not take him to where he is supposed to be. In the same vein, where a person puts in effort, but does not have the ability, he will still not get to where those who have both ability and effort can reach," he added.

First Class Is A Special Feat In Engineering -Dean

ngineering as a profession is different from other disciplines in the University or any other University in the country. The training process involved in the preparation for University education in the profession, which involves technical subjects such as Further Mathematics and Technical Drawing, is more tasking and intense which requires higher intelligence quotient than other disciplines.

Dean, Faculty of Engineering, Professor Samuel Ejezie dropped this hint while speaking with UNIPORT Weekly in his office, last Tuesday, stressing that the process of training certified Engineers takes a lot of effort to enable them meet global standards.

Professor Ejezie explained that any person who is engineering-bound must be classified as primus inter pares, disclosing that students of the Faculty of Engineering earn their degrees through persistent discipline and hard work. "To train a First Class in Engineering is a special feat; it is not wait-and-take and not an off-the-shelf commodity. First Class in Engineering is earned, not "produced". Our brilliant students earn their classes of degree either First Class or Second Class Upper Division. We just don't produce First Class; our students earn it the hard way" he said, adding that there is no room for error in awarding First Class to Engineering graduates.

According to the Dean, Engineering these days is becoming more complex, stating that as days roll by, Engineering keeps evolving from simplistic to complex processes such that structures to be constructed are also becoming more complex. Observing that the training process in the Engineering profession requires more stringent qualities which mean that students are expected to be sounder and hard working than their colleagues in other disciplines, Ejezie emphasized, stating that hard work remains the only key to securing top grades in Engineering programmes.

The former Head, Department of Civil and Environmental

Engineering, expressed hope that with the way the Faculty is going, the number of students who would earn First Class in future would increase in geometric proportions, adding that he no longer expects any student to graduate in the Third Class category. The least we expect henceforth would be the Second Class Lower Division, the Dean said. He explained that right now, the Faculty has succeeded in reforming the student body to now have a sense of belonging to face their seriously concentrate on their studies, adding that the Faculty is not admitting just any candidate. "This time, we stick to our carrying-capacity and those who meet our stringent requirements are very sound both in the classroom and paid or self-employment on graduation".

Professor Ejezie expressed satisfaction with the response received from students on the call for hard work, noting that once advice is given, they take it whole-heartedly. "The key thrust of my Deanship is to reposition the Faculty to become number one and students have given us their whole-hearted support. We are working together as partners in efforts aimed at producing quality graduates; students are our key partners in repositioning the University." he said.

Advising the outgoing students, Professor Ejezie said "You are passing into a different phase of life to a more challenging phase from where you were solely dependent on other people, to a place where you would become independent and so you should expect more challenges and when these challenges come, you must mobilize all the potentials in you to face them squarely". He said that the training given to the students has some potentials embedded in it for tacking challenges in life in the outside world.

The Dean appealed to the incoming students to beware of distractions in order not to be carried away by frivolous activities that could compromise their education, advising students who are ambitious to obtain the First Class Degree to begin their quest in the first year of admission into the University.

Professor Ajienka expressed optimism that as the first woman to lead ASUU in the University, the new Chairman would do well, assuring the new Executive of the willingness of the authorities to work with it to advance the cause of the University and staff welfare.

Stage Adaptation Of Elechi Amadi's The Concubine

ecently, the University Community was thrilled by the stage adaption of Elechi Amadi's first and very at The CRAB last February. The original novel, which could be considered a tragic work in literary parlance reincarnated as comedy at Theatre. That is if snatches of laughter in literary works define what is comic. But in the work under review, it came in large doses.

Fascinated by the success and applause that the play elicited from the audience and the Novelist himself, I thought it wise to bring to your reading delight the story behind the success of the performance.

The brain behind the drama adaptation and Lecturer in the Department of Theatre Arts, Edward Imo, said he was motivated to adapt the novel by his desire to bring the work



to a wider audience, irrespective of whether they have read

His words: "Basically, my motivation is largely drawn from the need to celebrate a classic work, the need to celebrate Elechi Amadi's creative ingenuity as deposited in The Concubine. As a novel, The Concubine readership had a span in history and so products of the present educational system in the country only hear about the novel from the lips of the older generation. And so, I felt that the young students should also have a feel of his creative import and I felt that the dramatic medium is the best way to express it because of its liveliness and immediacy of the Theatre, which usually elicits audience participation.

Imo, who played the role of a narrator in the stage adaptation, said he found in the novel a wonderful piece of drama and decided to put it on stage which gives it regularity in performance, as well as a wider audience, adding that plans are afoot to take it to press as a book of

He said that the first performance of the play which took



place at Hotel Presidential last December, was a huge

novel in one-hour and 20 minutes, which is the standard entertainment time. "No matter how long a drama is, it should not span beyond that time," Imo said, adding that the code-mixing used in the play were flavours introduced in furtherance of his artistic licence.

Corroborating Imo's word, another Lecturer in the Department, who directed the play, Mr Ovunda Ihunwo, recalled that "the novel spans through a long period, and if followed religiously, would span about five to six hours. So what I did was to point out the highpoints of the novel that would effectively relate the story," adding that he also advised the adaptor on the area of changing sets which could pose great challenges by introducing the role of the character of a narrator to bridge the scenes and allow for passage of time.

Ihunwo, who played the role of Ekwueme, said that "In dramaturgy, we have poetic licence; we also have artistic licence to do certain things, especially when it comes to adaptation. We just have to employ some techniques, not to distort the central message, but to help the adaptor drive me his point." He called for supports from public-spirited individuals to enable experts in the Department continue to stage impressive performances.

Other cast in the play included, Mr Friday Nwafor, a Lecturer in the Department who doubled as Agwoturumbe, the Dibia and Wokekoro as well as students, who played oma, Emenike, Ahurole and so on.

"In theatre, when we teach students, we also involve them in practice, without talking about seniority or discrimination between lecturers and students. This makes for easy assimilation. We act together," Mr Imo explained, charging the University Community to expect more from them.





to attain the needed development, there was need to integrate Science, Technology and Innovation to form a synergy for the technological advancement that would transform the country, pointing out that Nigeria has huge potentials with its size and population,

According to him, although, Nigeria has what it takes to be the giant of Africa, it has not been able to utilize the abundant human and material resources at her disposal to achieve the status, due to policy inconsistency. He said that lack of encouragement for young Nigerians, who are intellectually endowed with knowledge of invention that would help solve specific problems has brought about a situation where innovation has gone extinct, citing the Brain Drain syndrome as a case in point. He lamented that the country does not have a policy that encourages and promotes creativity and innovation.

The Director-General noted that the quest to attain the much touted Vision 20:2020 will be a mirage if conscious efforts are not made to develop Science and Technology, stressing that countries such as China, Malaysia, Indonesia and Venezuela which have emerged as industrialized nations were focused on key strategic development objectives. He advised that for Vision 20:2020 to be realized, government should take up each objective annually, appraising achievable milestones at the end of each year, adding that by so doing, it would achieve a lot within the time-frame.

Dr. Bindir stated that for Science and Technology to be meaningful in our context, the Industry and Universities must collaborate to achieve mutual goals, noting that in the developed world, Science and Technology are inseparable pair. He commended the policy objective of the present administration in the development of Science, Technology and Innovation.

In his remark, Chairman of the occasion, Group General Manager, Research and Development, Nigeria National Petroleum Corporation (NNPC), Engineer Nelson Oyudo, who commended the giant strides recorded in the University said, that the transformation is a result of the uncompromising stance of the authorities on standards. Engineer Oyudo, who was represented by Engineer Basil Ezeanikwe, said that the University has succeeded in integrating the community and industry into its activities. He said that NNPC will not be tired of partnering the Institution in accelerating the development of the country.

In his Address, Vice- Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, said that the event was a dream come true, pointing out that the University is on a mission to become an Entrepreneurial University. Vice-Chancellor (Research and Development), is in keeping with international best practice in university academic culture, adding that it would help the University to manage research efficiently and improve accountability to grant-making agencies. The Vice-Chancellor thanked NOTAP for establishing an IPPTO office in the University and solicited the collaboration of NOTAP to grow research and development in Nigerian universities.

Earlier in her address, Deputy Vice-Chancellor, Research and Development, Professor Bene Willie-Abbey, said that the University is gradually transforming from a traditional University to an Entrepreneurial University by working to become more enterprising and entrepreneurial activities, stressing that the vision of the Vice-Chancellor in striving towards an Entrepreneurial University has taken off in full swing.



UNIABUJA EMBROILS IN MULTIPLE CRISIS

s the ministerial task team on University of Abuja was yet to settle down to implement its mandate of working out modalities of meeting a six-month deadline for the accreditation of three suspended Faculties, the UNIABUJA Branch of the Academic Staff Union of Universities (ASUU), has added a new twist to the problem with its demand for the removal of the Vice-Chancellor, Professor James Adelabu.

The Faculties that require urgent accreditation, according to the Terms of Reference are: Medicine, Veterinary Medicine and Engineering. The task team, is expected to among other things, meet with professional regulatory bodies such as the Medical and Dental Council of Nigeria (MDCN), the Veterinary Council of Nigeria (VCN) and the Council for the Regulation of Engineering in Nigeria (COREN).



he new management of the Federal University of Petroleum Resources, Ugbomoro, Delta State, has directed its students to resume immediately. Final Year students were also urged to get prepared for their terminal examination, which they aborted owing to non-accreditation of some courses.

In an emergency meeting of Senate of the Institution, Final Year Students were asked to return to Campus as measures are in place to address thorny issues relating to the growth of the School which was upgraded to University status by the administration of former President Olusegun Obasanjo.

DELSU MATRICULATES 7.463

total of 7,463 fresh students took the Matriculation Oath at the Matriculation Ceremony of Delta State University, DELSU, Abraka last weekend. Vice-Chancellor, Professor Eric Arubayi, who recalled that the University was established in 1992 by the first Executive Governor of the State, Felix Ibru, advised the students to display good conduct to enable them achieve the primary purpose of being in the Institution, informing them that any students, who conducts him/herself in a manner that is at variance with the rules and regulations of the Institution would be sanctioned accordingly.

MALAYSIAN STUDENTS TO GAIN FREE ACCESS TO JOIN PARTIES. BUT NOT ON CAMPUS by Honey Virdee &

Bills to amend long standing laws banning students from joining political parties were tabled in Malaysia's parliament penultimate week, with student groups and opposition parties saying that restrictive university laws should be repealed not amended. Higher Education Minister, Khaled Nordin on Monday, 9th April, 2012, tabled

amendments to three laws including the 'notorious' Section 15 of the Universities and University Colleges Act, or UUCA (also known by its Malaysian acronym AUKU), as well as the Private Higher **Education and Education** Institutions Acts.

The amendments would allow students to join a political party, which is currently forbidden in the country.

However, the right to join political parties will only apply off-campus, to avoid undue influence of political parties on campuses and politicisation of universities, the Ministry has said.

Student organisations have said the amendments are cosmetic and do not go far enough to restore their constitutional rights. This is because political activities will continue to be forbidden at universities, including the right of students to stand for election or hold any posts in student societies, organisations or groups on campus. The issues raised are about student autonomy and freedom and not just membership of political parties, according to Solidariti Mahasiswa Malaysia, or SMM, an umbrella group of Malaysian student organisations.

would be installed at the University of Port Harcourt Teaching Hospital (UPTH) to make them easily accessible to a wider clientele in line with the vision of the donor.

Dr Ariweriokuma, who was accompanied by his wife, Sabinah and Project Consultant, Mr Amos James, said he was motivated to make the donation in recognition of the fact that "prostate cancer is silently killing productive men in their early 50s and above. The idea behind the gesture by my family is to enable health personnel deploy the equipment for early diagnosis and treatment of prostate cancer in men to allow them enjoy their lives better than many of them are doing at the moment", pointing out that early detection of the silent killer would save lives through its prevention. Prostate cancer is currently the second biggest killer disease amongst men in their 50s.

In addition to the equipment, the donor also announced that operational chemicals were included in the package to enable the Hospital put the equipment to use

immediately, disclosing that more of such chemicals would be made available every January to facilitate the screening process in the University and its environs. According to Dr Ariweriokuma, plans have also been concluded for the Consultant to train the personnel that would handle the equipment, hoping that the University and its environs would benefit from the donation once it becomes fully operational. He disclosed that the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Joseph Ajienka, reviewed a book he wrote on the oil and gas industry, a gesture that prompted him to donate some of the proceeds to social causes, including the money invested in purchasing the equipment given to the University.

Receiving the equipment, a visibly delighted Vice-Chancellor, said that "it is something of joy to see people who were once associated with the University returning to give back something for the benefit of those they left behind", disclosing that the donor had made valuable contributions as a former staff of the University. "I am very pleased to note that he has maintained this valuable relationship with the University where he still has most of his best friends", adding that Western nations enjoy good health largely on account of their capacity for early diagnosis and treatment of potentially life-threatening ailments that kill many people in Africa.

Professor Ajienka, who commended the good example of Dr Ariweriokuma to other publicspirited individuals and groups towards the public good, observed that such acts of philanthropy would necessarily attract the grace of the Almighty, expressing gratitude to the donor for his kind gesture aimed at saving lives in the University. He reiterated his call on industry players to bring their vast pool of experience to the University in a cross-fertilization of ideas that would be mutuallybeneficial to both parties and the larger society.

Also speaking, Provost of the College of Health Sciences, Professor Chris Akani, observed that "most people in privileged positions hardly remember their past associations in their future dealings. Such persons simply cultivate new associations to suit their enhanced status", expressing gratitude to Dr. Ariweriokuma for remaining in touch with the University, despite parting ways with it many years ago. He disclosed that the College had concluded plans to commence a lecture series on prostate cancer aimed at improving awareness of the killer disease amongst men in their 50s and above.
